Jesus answered, 'I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.' ⁴⁹Nathanael replied, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!' ⁵⁰Jesus answered, 'Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than these.'⁵¹And he said to him, 'Very truly, I tell you,² you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.'

THE FIRST ARTICLE

This is most certainly true.



Martin and Mary Ann Cory settled there in 1852 on land now occupied by the Highway 30 and Duff Avenue interchange, and the old sewage treatment plant. Billy Sunday - Wikipedia

William Ashley Sunday (November 19, 1862 – November 6, 1935) was an American athlete who, after being a popular <u>outfielder</u> in baseball's <u>National League</u>during the 1880s, became the most celebrated and influential American <u>evangelist</u> during the first two decades of the 20th century.^[1]

Born into poverty in <u>lowa</u>, Sunday spent some years at the <u>lowa Soldiers' Orphans' Home</u> before working at odd jobs and playing for local running and baseball teams. His speed and agility provided him the opportunity to play baseball in the <u>major</u> <u>leagues</u> for eight years, where he was an average hitter and a good fielder known for his base-running. Converting to <u>evangelical Christianity</u> in the 1880s, Sunday left baseball for the Christian ministry. He gradually developed his skills as a pulpit evangelist in the <u>Midwest</u> and then, during the early 20th century, he became the nation's most famous evangelist with his colloquial <u>sermons</u> and frenetic delivery. Sunday held widely reported campaigns in America's largest cities, and he attracted the largest crowds of any evangelist before the advent of electronic sound systems. He also made a great deal of money and was welcomed into the homes of the wealthy and influential. Sunday was a strong supporter of <u>Prohibition</u>, and his preaching likely played a significant role in the adoption of the <u>Eighteenth Amendment</u> in 1919.



The Sawdust Trail: Billy Sunday in His Own Words (Bur Oak Book) by William A. Sunday (Author)

Billy Sunday (1862-1935) was the best-known evangelist in America in the first half of the 20th century. Impoverished midwestern farm kid, professional baseball player, showman extraordinaire, unabashed patriot, and foe of the demon rum, this self-styled muscular Christian brought his brand of manly gospel to millions of Americans nationwide. Sunday connected with his fans through a combination of theatrics, conservative theology, and fervent patriotism; the circumstances of his life and work were consistent with a Horatio Alger-like myth of success that resonated with the millions of Americans of his time who had been transplanted from the farm to the city. Published serially in the Ladies' Home Journal in 1932 and 1933 and now in book form for the first time, *The Sawdust Trail* is the only autobiography that this hugely popular and hugely controversial preacher ever wrote. From his childhood days in Iowa to the early days of his conversion in Illinois, from his baseball career with the National League teams in Chicago, Pittsburgh, and Philadelphia to the challenges of preaching in New York City during his heyday, the sections of Sunday's autobiography roll out like so many exuberant sermons, yet the sympathetic reader can hear echoes of the loneliness and misery of his early years. In The Sawdust Trail the sometimes appalling but always appealing Billy Sunday creates a usable past for himself, notable for what he omits as well as for what he includes, which gives us insight not just into his own life and career but also into the peculiar history of evangelism in America.

The evangelists wanted to make sure those in attendance knew Jesus and that those in attendance shared Jesus with others.

Finding Home

I have long assumed that the main reason for the sawdust in the revival tents was to keep things from getting too muddy – and it sure did serve this function.

But recently I discovered that the image of a sawdust trail also had an important metaphorical meaning, derived from the nineteenth-century lumber camps. When lumberjacks got lost in the woods, they would walk in various directions until they found sawdust on the ground. Then, they would follow the sawdust trail back to a place of safety. The evangelist Billy Sunday knew of this practice and he used the image in calling sinners to follow the sawdust trail to a place of spiritual safety. Finding the way home has long been an important evangelical theme. It's also an image that speaks to my soul.

4) Goals Committee

As a co-editor of the *The Lobbyist* school newspaper while I was a sophomore at Waldorf Junior College in Forest City, Iowa, I wrote an editorial raising questions about the direction of the institution. The other co-editor went on to serve as a professor at the college to create a bachelor's program in Communications - Waldorf College. Subsequently, I was asked to serve as the student representative on the Waldorf College Goals Committee. The following piece by President Paul Mork outlined the directive to the committee:

Waldorf College Goals Committee

March 23, 1973

Basic purpose of the committee: To examine the philosophy, purpose, and aims of Waldorf in light of the present published Waldorf statement regarding the philosophy, purpose, and aims of the college and suggest any changes in these statements which the committee might deem necessary.

In working out this purpose I am suggesting that a "banner" or "flag" statement be developed which can serve as a kind of core statement concerning the mission and purpose of Waldorf College.

Mode of Operation for the Committee:

- 1. This committee will serve as the facilitating agency through which the ideas and input of the entire Waldorf community will be made. The Goals Committee will evaluate, condense, and put into acceptable form the material gathered.
- 2. The committee shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and a secretary. Three complete sets of minutes and all other materials related to the committee shall be kept.
- 3. Such sub-committee as may be needed will be formed. The Goals Committee shall have this power to form needed sub-committees.
- 4. A sincere effort must be made to gather the ideas and opinions of all in the Waldorf family (students, faculty, staff, administration, alumni, parents, community, church), whether these ideas are in or out of harmony with our position.
- 5. Continual reporting of the activities of this committee will be made through the Scroll and other college publications as the work proceeds.
- 6. At least a rough draft should be finished before the faculty-staff workshop prior to the opening of school next fall so that all faculty and staff can study and discuss the document.
- 7. When finished, the report of the committee will be presented to the Board of Regents for their evaluation.

Some of the questions which I think the committee should wrestle with are these:

- 1. What is our particular identity?
- 2. Do we function now in accord with our stated philosophy, purpose, and aims?
- 3. How can we have aims and objectives that are so clear that they are understood by all? And how do we make a goals statement really worth something in the life of the college?

As sub-committees are formed, their reports should be in and evaluated by the Goals Committee before the end of the present school term. This means that the bulk of the work of this committee must be done in the next two months.

I was presented the Deans Award on May 7, 1973:

In recognition of outstanding contributions to the life and work of Waldorf College, the 1973 Deans Award is presented to Lowell Bolstad this 7th day of May 1973.

This experience became a defining moment for me in deliberating mission, purpose, and goals for an institution, which, in looking back, helped to prepare me for pastoral ministry and interim ministry.

5) Christian Base Communities

I first became exposed to Christian Base Communities when I traveled to Mexico, Nicaragua, and El Salvador in February 1985 on a travel seminar with the Center for Global Education – Augsburg College.

Christian Base communities are autonomous <u>religious</u> groups often associated with <u>Liberation Theology</u>. The 1968 <u>Medellín</u>, <u>Colombia</u> meeting of Latin American Council of Bishops played a major role in popularizing them. Created in both rural and urban areas, the <u>Christian</u> Base Community, organized often illiterate <u>peasants</u> and proletarians into self-reliant worshiping communities through the tutelage of a priest or local lay member. Because established Christian parishes with active priests were often miles away and because high level church officials rarely visited even their own parishes these "base communities" were often the only direct exposure to the church for people in rural areas or those for whom a "local" church may be miles away. Thus, the base community was significant in changing popular interpretations of <u>Roman Catholicism</u> for multiple reasons. Initially, their very structure encouraged discussion and solidarity within the community over submission to church authority and, as their very name suggests, made power seem to flow from the bottom or base upward. The influence of liberation theology meant that discussions within the church were oriented toward material conditions and issues of class interests. Through this process of consciousness raising, evangelization turned into class consciousness.

From the Bishop

Are you up for a challenge?

"Nomads, Prodigals, and Exiles: A Panel of <u>Nones</u>" will be the evening program for Working Together/Synod Assembly, a unique opportunity for us to hear stories from a few folks that - for whatever reason - are not drawn to our "bricks and mortar" churches and

yet may still be seeking God.

Why wait until then to engage someone in conversation? Therefore, we invite all assembly delegates and visitors prior to June 7th to invite a "none" from your own community (essentially someone who doesn't go to church) to coffee or for a meal. Perhaps it's your neighbor, co-worker, friend, or family member... a chance for you to hear stories and journeys of faith and/or doubt from someone in your own backyard.

Assure them in advance that you're not going to try to invite them to church (or convert them)! Assure them that you're not going to ask them what your congregation can do differently to "attract" them. (If you need to, you can tell them your bishop asked you to do this in the first place!). Assure them that you have a lot to learn from them. And then, if they agree to meet with you (don't feel bad if they don't), be sure to mostly listen, and see where the Holy Spirit leads.

We will be praying that God will surprise you along the way!

To the dismay of religious leaders, study after study has shown a steady decline in affiliation and identification with traditional religions in America. By 2014, more than twenty percent of adults identified as unaffiliated--up more than seven percent just since 2007. These compelling stories are deeply revealing about how religion is changing in America-both for Nones and for the religiously affiliated family, friends, and neighbors with whom their lives remain intertwined.

What Is a None? A person who answers the question "What is your religion, if any?" with "None" joins the ranks of the unaffiliated—which is currently about 15 percent of American adults."

People who answer "None" are the fastest growing group in the religious landscape, growing by 138 percent since 1990. In contrast, people affiliating with Catholic congregations and Protestant groups failed to keep pace with the population growth of the past two decades.

Who Are the Nones? Most Christian groups have a female bias (approximately 60 percent of worshipers are women; 40 percent of worshipers are men). But the ratio of women to men among the Nones is reversed: 60 percent of Nones are men; 40 percent are women.

"Nones" on the Rise | Pew Research Center's Religion & Public Life Project

The number of Americans who do not identify with any religion continues to grow at a rapid pace. One-fifth of the U.S. public and a third of adults under 30 – are religiously unaffiliated today, the highest percentages ever in Pew Research Center polling. In the last five years alone, the unaffiliated have increased from just over 15% to just under 20% of all U.S. adults. Their ranks now include more than 13 million self-described atheists and agnostics (nearly 6% of the U.S. public), as well as nearly 33 million people who say they have no particular religious affiliation (14%).³

Reflections on the church's talking points

What ought to claim our attention now is "The Nones," those living in this post-Christian culture who claim no religious affiliation. Most of us were born when the culture agreed that church membership was part of the American way of life. That's less and less a given, particularly among younger generations, a trend we shouldn't view as a threat, but as an opportunity. Biblically and historically, the church is at its best as a missionary presence in a secular society, not as the dominant secular power. This is a good time to be the church.

But if that's true, we need to be clear on our talking points for this new time. When we gather, do we focus on questions of church membership and budgets? I think we center on these two talking points:

First of all, let's be clear and bold about why we believe people's lives are enriched and made full and abundant by being part of our congregations. And the reason is that we center our lives around the presence of the God of the universe whom we come to know in the person of Jesus Christ, a living spiritual presence in our lives, not an abstract idea or set of rules. A God of love lives here, and this community exists to share the presence of that love. This God draws close to people, and they'll hear that again and again in this place. They'll be grounded in a relationship with a loving God here.

And second, if we live this way, in relationship with that God-in-Christ, we love the world as Christ loves the world, and we do it so passionately that the world takes note. This church will not be a building on a corner with occasional club activities for its members: this is a church that matters, that has an impact, that cares about this community, and that gathers people who care about the whole world, particularly the world's pain.

I'm willing to stake the health of the church of the future on those two talking points. I'm willing to say that the life of the whole church— synod and churchwide organization included—is based on supporting our congregations to be those kind of healthy, focused communities and extending their impact into the world beyond themselves.

I'm willing to claim this growing era of post-Christendom as a gift and invitation. And I'm willing to bet that if we get these two talking points right, the future will take care of itself. The Lord of the Church has always seen to that—and invites us to be part of it.

Religious Preference: Ask Alban

- Q: It seems that a growing number of people indicate that their religious preference is "none"—or say, "I'm spiritual, but not religious." Is there anything that congregations can do differently? Are we becoming irrelevant?
- A. Loyalty to religious congregations may seem to be waning among some people and some people express this as a suspicion of the "organizational" aspects of religious communities or their leaders. This might get expressed in a variety of ways, including the statement "I am spiritual, not religious" or checking "none" on a religious affiliation survey. Rather than bemoan this apparent trend, I believe we can listen more deeply and learn from this. The fact of the matter is that not all of those who say they are "spiritual but not religious" are *outside* of our congregations. Some of them are sitting in our pews. I like to think that those who say they are "spiritual, but not religious affiliation may find pathways to a religious community at some point in their lives. In fact, research shows that many do.

But if the interim minister model is to continue to have value it will need more than tweaking. This is the case because the entire mainline Protestant church is caught in a huge cultural shift, an awkward intermediate stage or interim time between Christianity's cultural establishment and its disestablishment, or between mainline Protestantism's status as the default religious option in North American culture to a time of far greater religious choice and competition. Arguably, the interim model was conceived in a time of greater stability for historic or mainline Protestant denominations and congregations. Such congregations were an established feature of their cities, town and communities. Denominations themselves remained a significant and plausible brand. But in the thirty years since interim ministry was birthed, much has changed. Growing numbers of Americans switch denominations, even faiths. More Americans are electing for "none of the above" and opting out of religious affiliation altogether, while others are inhabiting the new world of "the spiritual but not religious." Fewer congregations experience themselves as moving from one stable-longer-term pastorate to another. More are struggling to discover their role and identity in a rapidly changing culture. I can imagine that interim ministry can continue to be helpful in such times and situations. But the work needs to be rethought or reformulated.

The Rise of the Nones: Understanding and Reaching the Religiously Unaffiliated [James Emery White]

The single fastest growing religious group of our time is those who check the box next to the word *none* on national surveys. In America, this is 20 percent of the population. Exactly who are the unaffiliated? What caused this seismic shift in our culture? Are our churches poised to reach these people?

James Emery White lends his prophetic voice to one of the most important conversations the church needs to be having

today. He calls churches to examine their current methods of evangelism, which often result only in transfer growth--Christians

moving from one church to another--rather than in reaching the "nones." The pastor of a megachurch that is currently experiencing 70 percent of its growth from the unchurched, White knows how to reach this growing demographic, and here he shares his ministry strategies with concerned pastors and church leaders.

On the one hand, if a congregation's reason for being is to stay open long enough so that the older members can be buried from the church, then such a notion becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy.

On the other hand, if the congregation wants faith to have children and for children to have faith, then there is a sustaining reason for being in the light of God's call to mission and service.

Will Our Children Have Faith? Revised Edition by John H. Westerhoff (Author)

The revised edition of a classic in Christian education

Originally written in 1976, this classic critique of Christian education is back in a revised edition. Christian education, according to Westerhoff, has modeled itself on the schooling-instructional paradigm of our secular schools. Instead of expecting faith formation to happen within a variety of contexts -- the family, church, school, and the church school -- religious education has been relegated entirely to Sunday morning classes. There children learn the facts about religion, but will they learn or experience faith? How can we be communities that nourish and nurture the faith of children, instead of only teaching them facts?

Each of the original chapters concludes with notes that reveal some of Westerhoff's rethinking of the material since 1976. A new Afterword explores the context in which we live currently, and its implications for catechetical ministry.

One congregation joined 2 others operating as a two-point parish to form a tri-parish only to request to be released from the parish agreement after 2 ½ years. I met with the Congregation Councils of the original 2 congregations to go through the transition dynamics and discern the call process. Understanding membership drop

Mainline denominations matter. America needs them. Our country is polarized: Conservative religious groups are synonymous with political conservatism, while more liberal groups seem out-of-touch. But mainline denominations—if they hold true to their heritage—provide a place where all kinds of people can live together and learn from each other as Christians. Black and white,

rich and poor, biblical literalists and modernists, political conservatives and liberals—all come together in one body to worship each week. This is critical to the well-being of society. It's time that mainline denominations celebrate this gift. Instead there is worry about declining numbers. We are well aware of the numbers.

Conservative religious groups including the Southern Baptists, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and the Assemblies of God have grown dramatically since 1940. At the same time, mainline denominations, including the United Methodists, the United Church of Christ, the Episcopal Church and the ELCA, all have declined in membership. But these trends need to be put in a broader context. Perhaps the figures aren't quite so bad, comparatively. And maybe

shifts in the fortunes of mainline and conservative religious groups are due to factors that have very little to do with being liberal or conservative.

Report on the 2006 ELCA congregational survey | The Lutheran

In July of 2006, Research and Evaluation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) fielded a questionnaire to 1000 ELCA congregations. Six hundred seventy-nine questionnaires were returned for a response rate of 68 percent. The questionnaire was designed to gather information about ELCA congregations and the pastors who serve them. The same questionnaire was also fielded to an additional 184 ELCA congregations who are members of the Willow Creek Association. We chose to focus on these congregations because their interest in the Willow Creek Association suggests that they are intentional about church growth. We wanted to know if these ELCA congregations differ from other ELCA congregations and we wanted to know if the differences produce growth. One hundred forty-three of these congregations returned questionnaires for a response rate of 78 percent.

10 trends to watch - The Lutheran Magazine

1. Declining church participation.

Who comes to church? According to the <u>General Social Survey</u>, the flagship poll of the <u>National Opinion Research Center</u> of the <u>University of Chicago</u>, fewer Americans are attending worship services. Weekly or more frequent attendance declined from 35 percent of the population in 1972 to 26 percent in 2008. At the same time, the number of Americans reporting that they never attend worship increased from 9 percent to 21 percent.

This trend has Roberto worried. "If you look at it generationally, the most loyal, the most engaged people are those 60 and older," he said. As that generation passes, they are followed by generations with "very low brand loyalty. In this next decade, we're going to see it in declining participation," he added.

Average worship attendance in the <u>ELCA</u> is 125 people, said Kenneth Inskeep, <u>ELCA</u> executive for research and evaluation. "I'm predicting that by 2020, it will be down around 100 [in worship attendance] if the present trends continue," he said. At that size, he noted, most congregations can't afford a full-time pastor.

But Inskeep argues that we miss the bigger issue if we only look at numbers. "Lutherans have a particularly important tradition to represent, which is ... that God is a gracious God. It's not about attendance ... it's about having a voice ... with enough people to speak and be heard in the broader culture," he said.

During the Cabinet presentation by Mark Chaves on September 18, 2007, we were shown evidence of an increasing concentration of attenders in large congregations. This trend is also apparent in the ELCA. In 1988, for example, 4.4 percent of all those attending worship in the ELCA were in congregations with 801 or more in worship. There is little debate that times are challenging for Lutherans throughout North America when it comes to reaching out and engaging people with the gospel. From 2002 to 2007, for example, about 6 percent of <u>ELCA</u> congregations grew 5 percent or more in worship attendance. At the same time, 60 percent of <u>ELCA</u> congregations lost 5 percent or more in worship attendance.

In the past, smaller and medium-sized congregations were most likely to decline. But from 2002 to 2007, as a group, the 90 congregations in the <u>ELCA</u> with 801 or more in worship saw their attendance decline by 6.5 percent. Nearly all of these large churches have contemporary worship services, a moderate to conservative theological perspective and a host of programs designed to appeal to those who expect congregations to meet their needs.

Living with these trends can be daunting. But those of us who believe Lutherans have so much to offer continue to be hopeful. Perhaps one day many more <u>ELCA</u> members will shake loose their inhibitions and give voice to the gospel.

Martin Luther was clear about this: "See, this is what it means to have a proper grasp of the gospel, that is, of the overwhelming goodness of God, which neither prophet, nor apostle, nor angel was ever able fully to express, and which no heart could adequately fathom or marvel at. This is the great fire of the love of God for us, whereby the heart and conscience become happy, secure, and content. This is what preaching the Christian faith means."

This gospel is exactly what North America needs and now is the time for Lutherans to speak up loudly and clearly. http://www.thelutheran.org/article/article.cfm?article_id=7526

11) Comprehensive Ministry Review

I served on a Synod Review Team as a part of a Comprehensive Ministry Review. Rev. Laurie Skow-Anderson, Assistant to the Bishop and Director for Evangelical Mission, led the review. Following is a cover letter she wrote explaining the process.

Dear Pastors and Congregational Presidents,

I'm writing to invite you to be part of a major effort to renew congregations in our synod. Twenty-five congregations in the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin are invited to participate in a Comprehensive Ministry Review in 2015-2016. A ministry review is an attempt to revitalize and renew congregations. If your congregation is in need of renewal, believes that God has a purpose for its future, and if it realizes that change is necessary, then you might consider a Comprehensive Ministry Review.

A team of four to five pastors and lay people from the synod will come to your congregation for the three-day ministry review. A ministry review process has four steps.

- 1. Renewal Profile completed by pastor and lay leaders. Email profile and last two annual reports to synod review team one week before the event.
- 2. Conversations with synod review team and pastor, community leaders, congregational leaders
- 3. Presentation of affirmations and recommendations to Congregation Council or congregation after worship on Sunday morning
- 4. Create an Action Team that will implement recommendations selected by the Congregation Council

Ideally this process will take place over a weekend. The schedule will look something like this:

I will return at a later day to present the final report to the Congregation Council and meet with the Action Team to help write and implement goals based on the recommendations your Congregation Council chooses.

Hospitality, meals, (and housing if necessary) for the synod review team are the responsibility of the congregation. Mileage and an honorarium for the volunteer members of the Synod Review Team is appreciated.

This process can be condensed to an all-day Saturday and Sunday a.m. event or on a Wednesday with a return visit on Sunday. Costs for the Comprehensive Ministry Review

- 1. Supper on Friday for Synod Review Team and pastor (6 people)
- 2. Saturday lunch, coffee, and snacks for the congregational leaders meeting (15 people) and light supper for Synod Review Team (5 people).

The Synod Review Team is made up of two pastors and two lay people from area congregations. A new team is created for each ministry review. I do not know exactly how many miles the review team members will need to drive.

- 3. Mileage at .55 a mile. (50 miles = \$27. 100 miles = \$55.)
- 4. Honorarium range is \$50-100. You may give whatever you like for that honorarium.

There are generally four people on the review team besides me, the leader. I do not get paid. This is part of my call as Assistant to the Bishop and Director for Evangelical Mission.

- 5. Excluding food and housing, the cost for the Comprehensive Ministry Review is mileage and honorarium, which would range from \$104 to \$210 per person.
- 6. Housing might be needed if the distance is over 100 miles from Synod Review Teams' homes.

12) A time for discernment

I wrote the following piece for the newsletter at one interim assignment in a large downtown congregation.

A "time for discernment" is being proposed for the time between the annual meeting and the Day of Pentecost. This three-month period will allow time for prayerful conversation around the three areas outlined below (unity, vision, and mission). [Only mission will be included in this chapter. Unity and vision will be included in respective chapters.] This exercise is intended to be used in the many and various groups and individuals in the congregation. Participants are invited to respond in writing to the questions offered around these three areas. Please give your signed comments to Pastor Lowell Bolstad. These will then be used by the Congregation Council for envisioning and leading this congregation into greater unity, clearer vision, and expanded mission. Mission – What opportunities is God laying before us to expand our life and mission as the people of God here in this place? Read and discuss the appointed texts for the Fourth Sunday after Epiphany: Micah 6:1-8, 1 Corinthians 1:18-31, Matthew 5:1-12. What do these passages say about the life and mission of the people of God? Healthy groups build on strengths and address areas needing improvement. What are the strengths of this congregation? What are areas needing improvement? Reflect on the statement: "One does not come to church simply to get something out of church but also what one can give to others by one's participation. This congregation has engaged in two extensive self-studies. Take time to revisit the initiatives called for in these two studies. Reflect on the effectiveness in carrying out these initiatives. In what ways have those initiatives been addressed? What more needs to be done? What other areas can be addressed as opportunities for life and mission? Why is it important to have a sense of unity, vision, and mission!

14) Opening the front door and closing the back door

Pastor Nate Aaseng served St. John's Lutheran Church in Eau Claire, Wisconsin for 10 years, and in his last newsletter column upon his upcoming retirement he wrote, "I congratulate and thank all the disciples of St. John's who have opened their hearts and have worked hard to make this the kind of mission-driven church that allows God's work to be joyfully done through us so that this has become the healthy, strong congregation that the CAT seems to indicate." He went on to say that the people have done a good job opening the front door and closing the back door.

A Note from Pastor Aaseng

The recent Congregational Assessment Tool provided a very positive report on the vitality of St. John's in many areas. As I studied it, one question that I could not help but ask was, "What would the CAT have said 10 years ago?" A snapshot of a congregation in a particular point in time provides a great deal of information, but even more information would be

provided by knowing how St. John's has changed over a decade. Were there areas that improved significantly, declined significantly, or did it basically stay the same?

My only reference in this regard is a church newsletter article that I wrote when I first arrived, that analyzed a few trends. The statistics showed this congregation faced a serious challenge, as did virtually all of the other ELCA congregations in Eau Claire. After presenting the data regarding church membership, worship attendance, etc., my conclusions were, that as of 2008, unless significant changes were made, St. John's was one of four congregations that were in greatest jeopardy regarding survival past 2028.

What has happened since then? Among the five congregations that did not appear to be in immediate jeopardy, three experienced serious declines. Two of them merged into one congregation.

Meanwhile, as indicated by the CAT report, St. John's prospects have improved significantly. I congratulate and thank all the disciples of St. John's who have opened their hearts and have worked hard to make this the kind of mission-driven church that allows God's work to be joyfully done through us so that this has become the healthy, strong congregation that the CAT seems to indicate.

I think that it is significant that St. John's has done a great job in "closing the back door." That means that because people here find meaning and acceptance that we have not experienced a great exodus of those leaving for other congregations. I believe that St. John's has also done a good job in "opening the front door," making this a welcoming place for all those who seek a Christian faith community.

What I would urge this congregation to improve on is guiding people to that open door. Our faith community has been enriched whenever our disciples here have encouraged others to come and be a part of this experience. I know what it is like to be a part of a church in such a state of disarray that you don't feel comfortable bringing anyone into the mess. The CAT gives objective evidence that St. John's is not such a place, and that those who walk through our doors will find acceptance, meaning, and purpose. Let's do them a favor and make a point of ensuring that they find us!

15) Recruit or relate?

An article on the front page of a newspaper on the newsstand at a convenience store caught my attention: "Extremist recruiters online and relentless: U.S. Muslim leaders have swung into action against them." It described how ISIS is using social media to recruit young people in this country to their cause and how Muslim leaders are trying to counteract this offensive.

U.S. Muslims Take on ISIS' Recruiting Machine – The New York Times

STERLING, Va. — Imam Mohamed Magid tries to stay in regular contact with the teenager who came to him a few months ago, at his family's urging, to discuss how he was being wooed by online recruiters working for the Islamic State, the extremist group in Syria and Iraq.

But the imam, a scholar bursting with charm and authority, has struggled to compete. Though he has successfully intervened in the cases of five other young men, persuading them to abandon plans to fight overseas, the Islamic State's recruiting efforts have become even more disturbing, he said, and nonstop.

"The recruiters wouldn't leave him alone," Imam Magid said of the young man he met with recently. "They were on social media with him at all hours, they tweet him at night, first thing in the morning. If I talk to him for an hour, they undo him in two hours."

The next day, I talked with congregation leaders where a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) analysis was being used. When it came to threats, the leaders identified the "recruiting" by members of two large conservative non-denominational congregations in a nearby city of the youth in their smaller congregation located in a village. They talked about how they can continue to keep their young people involved in the life and mission of the congregation.

Earlier that month, Bishop James Hazelwood Synod Leaders - New England Synod speaking at the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin Mid-Winter Theological Retreat led the attendees in a Bible study on Luke 10:1-12 "The Mission of the Seventy." He stated that he believes this text is especially appropriate for the present post-Christendom context and emphasized the insight gained from the text on the importance of building relationships.

My observation is that congregation members in mainline denominations, such as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, tend to feel uncomfortable with recruitment outreach but more comfortable with relational evangelism.

Relational Evangelism with Young Adults - Alban Institute

Lastly, relational evangelism is crucial in an age of religious pluralism. Rather than deny religious difference, relational evangelism equips young adults to be secure enough in talking about their own faith to engage actively and authentically in interreligious dialogue and community action for the common good. "Evangelism is about proclaiming God's love for the 'other,'" says Lisa Kimball, professor of Christian formation and congregational leadership at Virginia Theological Seminary, "It is not about keeping score of who is saved and who isn't." In fact, the spirit of mutuality and intentional listening characteristic of relational evangelism opens up the follower of Jesus to God's love in a way that seeks deeper relationship with all of creation and responds to the suffering of the world. In a religiously pluralistic world, relational evangelism contributes to the creation of healthy environments in which young adults listen to God at work in their lives and discern ways their gifts can contribute to the reign of God for all humankind.

The mission of the Seventy

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and **sent** them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you." 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



Johan Arnd Aasgaard - Wikipedia

Johan Arnd Aasgaard was born in <u>Albert Lea, Minnesota</u>. He was educated at <u>St. Olaf College</u> in <u>Northfield</u>, <u>Minnesota</u> (class of 1898). He graduated from the United Church Seminary in <u>Saint Paul</u>, <u>Minnesota</u> (now known as <u>Luther Seminary</u>). He was ordained a minister in the <u>Norwegian Lutheran Church of America</u>, later known as the <u>Evangelical Lutheran Church</u>.^[2]

Aasgaard was pastor of Christ Lutheran Church in <u>De Forest, Wisconsin</u> from 1901–11. He taught at United Church Seminary from 1906–07. He served as president of <u>Concordia College</u> in <u>Moorhead, Minnesota</u> from 1911–25. Aasgaard was President of the <u>Norwegian Lutheran Church of America</u> from 1925–1954.^{[3][4]}

Aasgaard subsequently helped lay groundwork for the merger that resulted in formation of <u>American Lutheran Church</u> in 1960. The American Lutheran Church resulted from the merger of the Evangelical Lutheran Church (United States) with the <u>United Evangelical Lutheran Church</u> and a predecessor church body known as the American Lutheran Church.^[5] <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Johan_Arnd_Aasgaard</u>

Peter Steinke helps church leaders to see the difference between a focus on mission

Mission vs Clergy Focused Congregations - Psyche and Spirit

Many ministers are already familiar with Peter Steinke's clergy-focused vs. mission-focused distinction. And, in the life of a congregation, various factors may appropriately shift members from one focus to the other. Congregations, however, may develop this leaning subtly over time; may lurch in one direction or the other in response to a specific event; or may shift due to current powers-that-be in Council memberships, pastoral teams, etc.

Think about an "issue" facing you or your congregation at the present time. How might any conflict within that issue be arising from tensions between positions reflecting one or the other focus? The following is a brief summary of these positions:

The Marks of a Healthy Congregation - UUA

Steinke then outlined the characteristics of health congregations:

Healthy congregations focus on mission. This, he pointed out, does not mean merely that the congregation has a mission statement, but that it uses that mission statement to organize its activities. A good mission statement, Steinke noted, is no longer than a sentence, with no more than one comma, "can be understood by a 12-year-old and can be repeated at gunpoint." Mission helps mobilize the energy of the community; if the congregation isn't focused on mission, it will focus on its past, its budget, problems or something else.

Healthy Congregations Make Healthy Choices

Dr. Peter Steinke, the guru of congregational systems now that Rabbi Edwin Friedman has passed, writes about focus in his book Healthy Congregations, an Alban Institute publication. He mentions two unhealthy patterns of congregations that become over-focused on clergy. "First," Steinke writes, "when over-focused on the pastor, people find it immensely difficult to see the rest of the system. As a result, they are blind to how other forces and people contribute to what is happening. Perspective is distorted. . . Second, when a congregation is over-focused on clergy, it cannot keep its focus on its mission. Instead of focusing on who they are and what they are about as a community, they peer intently at who the pastor is and what the pastor does. Again, perspective is skewed." (Peter L. Steinke, Healthy Congregations, The Alban Institute, Herndon, VA, 1996 and 2006; p. 45).
