# 1) "Why do we do what we do? Is God at the center?"

I went to a workshop on Student Panel: Reflections by Pastoral Interns on "Religious but Not Spiritual" convened by Kathryn Ostlie Olson at the 2015 Mid-Winter Convocation - Luther Seminary. One of the students related how she grew up in a congregation with a praise band, screen, and projection, and then did her internship in a congregation steeped in the ancient western rites:

#### Mount Olive Lutheran Church

It's rare to find a socially progressive church that keeps and cherishes traditional liturgy. But that's the blend that draws worshipers from a wide area to Mount Olive's doorstep in Midtown Minneapolis.

We describe ourselves as *musical, liturgical, and welcoming.* By *musical* we mean to emphasize our reputation for congregational singing and organ playing. By *liturgical* we mean to identify ourselves with timeless rituals that are astonishingly powerful in today's world. By *welcoming* we mean to underscore our openness to all comers. We cannot imagine Christ's church as an exclusionary body. Neither can we imagine the Christian life as a solely private relationship. And so, we are compelled to serve others, near and far. In our serving, we are imperfect. We are human. We stumble. We have as many questions as answers. But we lean on God's grace and on each other. And that seems to give our parish – now entering its second century – a lasting strength.

# A Quivering Mass of Availability

Will Willimon writes in Pastor: The Theology and Practice or Ordained Ministry

The pastor is [often] reduced to the level of the soother of anxieties brought on by the dilemmas of affluence, rather than the caller of persons to salvation. My colleague Stanley Hauerwas has accused the contemporary pastor of being little more than "a quivering mass of availability." Practicing what I call "promiscuous ministry"- ministry with no internal, critical judgment about what care is worth giving- we become victims of a culture of insatiable need. We live in a capitalist, consumptive culture where there is no purpose to our society other than "meeting our needs." The culture gives us the maximum amount of room and encouragement to "meet our needs" without appearing to pass judgment on which needs are worth meeting... In this vast supermarket of desire, we pastors must do more than simply "meet people's needs." The church is also about giving people the critical means of assessing which needs give our lives meaning, about giving us needs we would not have had if we had not met Jesus.

# Vital signs - Wikipedia

Vital signs (also known as vitals) are a group of the four to six most important medical signs that indicate the status of the body's vital (life-sustaining) functions. These measurements are taken to help assess the general physical health of a person, give clues to possible diseases, and show progress toward recovery. [1][2] The normal ranges for a person's vital signs vary with age, weight, gender, and overall health. [3]

There are four primary vital signs: body temperature, blood pressure, pulse (heart rate), and breathing rate (respiratory rate), often notated as BT, BP, HR, and RR. However, depending on the clinical setting, the vital signs may include other measurements called the "fifth vital sign" or "sixth vital sign". Vital signs are recorded using the LOINC internationally accepted standard coding system.<sup>[4][5]</sup>

# Beyond the Worship Wars: Building Vital and Faithful Worship [Thomas G. Long - Bandy Professor of Preaching]

Almost every congregation is experiencing tension over worship. Many congregations have been participating in a renaissance of worship known as the "liturgical movement" and have reclaimed worship forms that have served the church for centuries. Yet because the church today is operating in a radically changed cultural environment, many people in our society do not understand liturgical worship and thus we must find language, music, themes, and images that speak to the unchurched, spiritually seeking person. In Beyond the Worship Wars, Thomas G. Long discusses the nine characteristics of vital and faithful worship practiced by a wide range of "third-way" congregations—all characteristics that make for vital and faithful worship.

#### Signs of Faithful Discipleship

The common theme among the texts for this Sunday is "Signs of Faithful Discipleship." Keep that larger theme in mind as you design the worship space for today, asking yourself (and others in your congregation and community) where you see such signs in your midst today -- or perhaps opportunities you may have, but have not yet taken, to display such signs. Acts 2 is the finale of the Pentecost sermon. One might note that the finale of the sermon itself was last week. But the real "end," the real point of a sermon is not its words, but how people live in response to them. Today we see multiple signs of a vital response to this sermon. These were not signs of vital congregations (at this point, there were zero congregations!) but rather signs of the Holy Spirit at work among believers, transforming their lives in every way imaginable.

From Dick's research emerged clear identifiers of four church types: decaying, dystrophic, retrogressive, and vital. With candor Dick describes each, including examples of communities within the types. While reading about these types may be painful, the intent is to provide tools to move toward vitality. ""Making church easy is the opposite of making the church faithful,"" Dick writes. ""Vital churches challenge us to remember that the church is God's, not ours, and being Christian disciples is more involved than simply believing in Jesus as the Son of God. ... To be the church for the world requires that we become vital."" Though this study is based on United Methodist churches, its lessons are relevant for all congregations. Help yours become transformed into a community that works - hard - together to engage in courageous ministries of witness!

# Vital Worship, Healthy Congregations - Alban at Duke Divinity School

We can identify several specific factors that contribute to spiritually vital worship and thereby strengthen congregational life.

- •Congregations, and the leaders that serve them, need a shared vision for worship that is grounded in more than personal aesthetic tastes. This vision must draw on the deep theological resources of Scripture, the Christian tradition, and the unique history of the congregation.
- •Congregational worship should be integrated with the whole life of the congregation. It can serve as the "source and summit" from which all the practices of the Christian life flow. Worship both reflects and shapes the life of the church in education, pastoral care, community service, fellowship, justice, hospitality, and every other aspect of church life.
- •The best worship practices feature not only good worship "content," such as discerning sermons, honest prayers, creative artistic contributions, celebrative and meaningful rituals for baptism and the Lord's Supper. They also arise out of good process, involving meaningful contributions from participants, thoughtful leadership, honest evaluation, and healthy communication among leaders.

# Reconnecting Worship: Where Tradition and Innovation Converge [Rob Weber, Stacy Hood]

How does a congregation create a healthy balance of rich tradition and desired innovation? Does rapid change make it necessary for congregations to be innovative in such things as worship and music styles? Or should leaders make an effort to keep their congregation focused on the inherited traditions and practices of the church. This kit is designed for pastors, musicians, worship teams, worship committees, and general church leadership--all those who frequently find themselves in turmoil when caught between remaining faithful to their denominational roots (for example, Wesleyan, Calvinist, or Lutheran) while engaging innovation. Specific questions pertain to the use of new music and technology, maintaining theological integrity, as well as planning and facilitating a multifaceted approach to worship development. These questions emerge from those trying to initiate change within an existing congregation as well as those starting new churches. This resource will help pastors, other worship leaders and planners, and laypersons discuss and learn about innovation that is faithful in also communicating tradition.

ReConnecting Worship is helpful for churches wanting to remain faithful to tradition yet are striving to engage innovation. Whether congregations need to start an alternative service, develop worship for a new congregation, or infuse a new creativity into existing worship teams, ReConnecting Worship can provide guidance, information and inspiration to worship teams and other groups seeking to deepen their understanding of and participation in worship. This project can be helpful for:

- Existing churches trying to deepen congregational understanding and experience of worship
- Churches with more than one worship style who want to increase cohesion among church members and overcome tensions based in stylistic differences
- Churches that are reshaping worship to reach groups of people with different generational or cultural backgrounds
- Churches starting new or alternative worship experiences
- New churches planning to launch their inaugural worship experience In times of congregational change, information about worship needs to be experienced in a way that promotes discussion and multilayered learning.

ReConnecting Worship provides video session that include examples of innovation in worship with integrity, interview with church leaders experiencing tension and positive change, and practical suggestions for planning and implementation in a variety of settings.

# 5) Moving from conform to recommend

The constitution for congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church included the following on worship:

#### ARTICLE IV

# Liturgy, Ritual, Hymnbook

The public services of this congregation shall conform to the Authorized Liturgies and Rituals of The Evangelical Lutheran Church, and the authorized hymnbooks of the Church and such materials as shall be approved by the Congregation for use in its worship and schools.

#### Evangelical Lutheran Church (United States) - Wikipedia

The Norwegian Lutheran Church of America was formed by merger of the Hauge Synod (est. 1876), the Norwegian Synod (est. 1853), and the United Norwegian Lutheran Church of America (est. 1890). The NLCA changed its name to The Evangelical Lutheran Church (ELC) in 1946. In 1960, the ELC joined with other Lutheran churches to form the American Lutheran Church. This coalescence of Lutheran churches continued into recent times, with the ALC joining others to form the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) in 1988.

The constitution for congregations of the American Lutheran Church included the following on worship:

#### Article VIII - WORSHIP

As an expression of the unity of the church in Christ the congregation recognizes the desirability of conforming to the practices of other member congregations in using such forms of worship, including liturgies and hymn books, as are recommended by The American Lutheran Church. Only such variations as are authorized by the congregation shall be permitted.

#### American Lutheran Church - Wikipedia

The American Lutheran Church (ALC or sometimes TALC) was a Christian Protestant denomination in the United States that existed from 1960 to 1987. Its headquarters was in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Upon its formation in 1960, the ALC designated Augsburg Publishing House (est. 1891), also located in Minneapolis, as the church publisher. The *Lutheran Standard* was the official magazine of the ALC.

# Chapter 12.

# **CONGREGATION COUNCIL**

- **C12.04.** The Congregation Council shall have general oversight of the life and activities of this congregation, and in particular its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The duties of the Congregation Council shall include the following:
  - i. To recommend and encourage the use of program resources produced or approved by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

# 2. The Gathering Will Become The Sending

For the many churches that have adopted an attractional model, the unspoken expectation is that people gather predominantly to come and see.

Combine that with a highly individualist consumer culture, and that's how most people will view church: a place to gather, consume and leave.

Naturally, that's a huge mistake, but it reflects the era we live in.

How do you combat that?

Instead of seeing Sunday only as a gathering, wise leaders will also see it as a sending. Tiffany DeLuccia had some great thoughts on this over at Tony Morgan's blog recently.

The gatherings of the early church were not just a place to worship, learn and encourage, they involved a sending out into the world to change the world.

The Reformed four-fold pattern of worship embodies this so well. While the church gathers, it also sends.

The goal of a service is not to applaud the message or talk about how amazing the music was. The goal is to go back out into the world for which Christ died better equipped to live out and share our faith.

Figuring out how not just to dismiss people when the service is over but to send people out in the world equipped to live and lead differently is critical.

Church is not a spectator sport. It's a place of transformation.

Future churches will embrace that.

# Keeping the Sabbath Wholly: Ceasing, Resting, Embracing, Feasting [Marva J. Dawn]

"But I don't wanna go to church!" Marva Dawn has often heard that cry—and not only from children. "What a sad commentary it is on North American spirituality," she writes, "that the delight of 'keeping the Sabbath day' has degenerated into the routine and drudgery—even the downright oppressiveness—of 'going to church."

According to Dawn, the phrase "going to church" both reveals and promotes bad theology: it suggests that the church is a static place when in fact the church is the *people of God*. The regular gathering together of God's people for worship is important—it enables them to *be church* in the world—but the act of worship is only a small part of observing the Sabbath. Combining sound biblical theology and research into Jewish traditions with many practical suggestions, *Keeping the Sabbath Wholly* offers a healthy balance between head and heart: the book shows how theological insights can undergird daily life and practice, and it gives the reader both motivation and methods for *enjoying* a special holy day.

Dawn's work— unpretentiously eloquent, refreshingly personal in tone, and rich with inspiring example—promotes the discipline of Sabbath-keeping not as a legalistic duty but as the way to freedom, delight, and joy. Christians and Jews, pastors and laypeople, individuals and small groups—all will benefit greatly from reading and discussing the book and putting its ideas into practice.

# Sabbath Keeping [Donna Schaper]

One of the marks of the Jews during this time was observation of the Sabbath. Ever since the days of Moses, the Israelite people were to respond to what God had done for them (the Exodus) by keeping the Ten Commandments. The third of these was "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy (Exodus 20:1-17). The people were to do no work on the Sabbath. The Hebrew word for Sabbath means to stop. When the hostile enemies asked Nehemiah to stop building the wall around Jerusalem he said, "I am doing a great work and I cannot come down. Why should the work *stop* (Hebrew *sabbath*) while I leave it to come down to you? (Nehemiah 6:3).

IV. WEEKLY, ANNUAL AND SABBATICAL TIME COMPENSATION

A. SABBATH DAY (Recommended: 40 to 45 hours per week; at least one full day off)

1. Weekly Rhythm of Work and Rest Full-time called rostered leaders of our congregations must strive for a healthy balance in their lives between their time for God, time for their families and personal life, and their calling to the church. Clearly defined expectations of work and time off are important for both the rostered leader and the congregation. Knowing that some weeks will be more demanding and some less, 40 to 45 hours per week is a fair expectation for both congregation and rostered leader. A Sabbath day each week is God's command and, even more importantly, God's gift.

So, when I found The Hymnal and Order of Service Authorized by The Evangelical Lutheran Augustana Synod Lectionary Edition from the Swedish Lutheran tradition in the pastor's study at one congregation, I looked inside with great interest. I found a collect, epistle, and gospel printed for I and II, theme, and hymn recommendations.

#### 12) Repentance in services of worship

It seems that, increasingly, the Confession and Forgiveness as well as the Creed are omitted, while at the same time the Great Thanksgiving is included as a part of a larger liturgical movement away from a "penitential piety" in Lutheran tradition to a "eucharistic piety" prevalent in ecumenical liturgical circles. Do away with those parts, which might be considered hierarchical and instead emphasize the human cooperation with the divine, seems to be the order of the day. I use the Confession and Forgiveness to preserve the Lutheran emphasis on sinner/saints in need of confession and forgiveness rather than the Thanksgiving for Baptism. I include the Creed as the historic articulation of what the assembly believes. I am not necessarily arguing for returning to the use of The Exhortation before Holy Communion used in *The Lutheran Hymnary* (1913), but, I do not include the Great Thanksgiving in the Lord's Supper so that the Words of Institution function as being sufficient in expressing God's movement in Jesus Christ "for you."

#### THE NATURE OF THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR

What is the Sacrament of the Altar?

The Sacrament of the Altar is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, under the bread and wine, instituted by Christ himself, for us Christians to eat and to drink.

Where is this written?

The holy evangelists Matthew, Mark, Luke, together with St. Paul, write thus: "Our Lord Jesus Christ, the same night in which He was betrayed, took bread; and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to His disciples, saying, 'Take, eat; this is My body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of Me.' In the same way also He took the cup after supper, gave thanks and gave it to them, saying, 'Drink from it all of you; this cup is the New Testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the remission of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."

# THE BENEFIT OF THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR

What benefit do we receive from such eating and drinking?

The benefit which we receive from such eating and drinking is shown us by these words: "Given and shed for you for the remission of sins," namely, that in the Sacrament forgiveness of sins, life and salvation are given us through these words. For where there is forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation.

#### THE POWER OF THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR

How can bodily eating and drinking do such great things?

It is not the eating and drinking that does this, but the words here written, "Given and shed for you for the remission of sins." These words, along with the eating and drinking, are the main thing in the Sacrament; and whoever believes these words has exactly what they say, namely, the forgiveness of sins.

# THE PROPER RECEPTION OF THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR

Who then receives this Sacrament worthily?


Fasting and bodily preparation are indeed a fine outward training; but he is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words, "Given and shed for you for the remission of sins." But he who does not believe these words, or doubts them, is unworthy and unprepared; for the words "for you" require truly believing hearts.

#### Worship as Repentance: Lutheran Liturgical Tradition and Catholic Consensus [Walter Sundberg]

Against contemporary trends that conceive of Christian worship primarily as entertainment or sheer celebration, Walter Sundberg argues that *repentance* is the heart of authentic worship. In *Worship as Repentance* Sundberg outlines the history of repentance and confession within liturgical practice from the early church to mid-twentieth-century Protestantism, advocating movement away from the "eucharistic piety" common in mainline worship today and toward the "penitential piety" of older traditions of Protestant worship.



I attended a Roman Catholic church on 1/19/2020 while using allotted vacation. The gospel text for 2EpiphanyA was John 1:29-42. The priest preached for 12 minutes on The Lamb of God in which he expounded on the sacrifice of the lamb from the Passover to the Last Supper in order to explain the Roman Catholic stance on the Eucharist as a sacrifice of thanksgiving. The priest presided at the transubstantiation of the elements from the time the ushers presented the offering and the elements to the time the ushers ushered the people to receive the elements for a period of 15 minutes. Meanwhile, back at the multiple-point parish to which I was assigned, a lay preacher officiated and preached at a Service of the Word. When I preached and presided at the Service of Holy Communion in that parish, the order for the service of worship after the Offering was Offering Prayer, Words of Institution, Lord's Prayer, Invitation. My teacher at Luther Seminary most clearly informed my thinking on this matter.

Rolf Jacobson, associate professor of Old Testament at Luther Seminary, shares these memories...

(An aside: Gerhard didn't much care for the term "eucharist" because it messes up the direction of the Lord's Supper, focusing on our being thankful rather than on the promised presence of Christ in the bread and wine. He pointed out that the term eucharist never occurs in the New Testament in reference to the sacrament and said, "Paul called it the Lord's Supper. If it's good enough for Paul, it's good enough for me.")

In the confusion of the contemporary church it is essential to maintain a sense for the objectivity of the gifts of divine grace. It is of utmost importance just who is giving and who is given in the sacraments. We are to eat and drink in remembrance of the Lord. Thus, what we should be called the Lord's Supper. That is the earliest biblical name (I Cor 11:20) as well as the most apt and comprehensive designation for the sacrament. Other designations, particularly "the Eucharist," are theologically misleading and deceptive. We need to look at these two effects, the change in subject and the quest of sacrifice, a bit more closely.

# 13) Stand for something

A musician at a neighboring congregation showed a book to me that the pastor had recommended as a blueprint for attracting people to services of worship (or at least not detracting them). Among other things, the book recommended that the Confession and Forgiveness, Creed, and Lord's Prayer all be deleted. Confession and Forgiveness is to be avoided, the book recommended, because seekers might feel bad, and isn't the point of services of worship to make people feel good? The Creed, the book contended, asks seekers to profess something they might not be ready to profess, and, when many people recite the Lord's Prayer, seekers may feel out of place for not being able to do so. All of which reminds me of the quote from the late U.S. Senate Chaplain Peter Marshall: "If you don't stand for something you will fall for anything."

The *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* includes all 150 psalms, whereas the previous *Lutheran Book of Worship* included less than the full psalter. Richard Nysse, in a presentation on "Laments in a Time of Change" as a part of the Mid-Winter Convocation 2013 at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN, argued that laments express the pain of the human condition and can be a form of evangelism. He invited

the participants to listen to some songs in the context of the lament psalms: I'm Tryin' – Trace Adkins, Done Too Soon – Neil Diamond, The Circle Game – Tom Rush, Gravedigger – Dave Matthews, The Class of '57 – Statler Brothers, Time Marches On – Tracy Lawrence, Candle in the Wind – Elton John, Remember When – Alan Jackson. Then, he asked the participants to see how the biblical laments provide opportunities to direct the laments to God.



The prayer of lament is the "unsettling tradition of prayer that includes expressions of complaint, anger, grief, despair and protest to God," found throughout the Bible, most often in the Psalms. One who did not believe in God could not have written these laments; they are honest, open conversations with a living, listening, God. The prayer of lament can coexist with the prayer of praise and joy; in fact, it must if those that suffer are to be honest with them and with God. "How can the prayer of lament be free and joyful if the realities of broken human life are not named and lamented?" Lament adds to the wholeness of Christian life and has its place with praise and thanksgiving in a holistic understanding of prayer. I highly recommend this book for those that are grieving or are seeking to comfort those that are suffering.

# Risking Truth: Reshaping the World through Prayers of Lament (Princeton Theological Monograph Series) [Scott A. Ellington]

Ours is a world characterized by change. Often the most fundamental changes in our lives result from experiences of profound suffering and loss as we are wrenched from our familiar world and driven into one that is alien. In the midst of such loss, we are compelled to choose between trying to cling to the remnants of a reality that is passing away and trying to make a home in a strange new world. Biblical prayers of lament wait for us at this crossroad of loss and newness. Prayers of lament are marked both by loss and by the inexplicable silence of God. Everything we believe about God's justice and goodness is placed in doubt by his hiddenness. The cry of lament is an act of tremendous risk. To lament is to abandon the sinking ship of religious certainty and strike out in a small dingy, amidst stormy seas, in search of a hidden God. Faced with God's silence, the biblical writers are willing to place at risk their most fundamental beliefs and to lament. The Psalm writers risk the loss of the Exodus story by crying out to a God who has failed to save, demanding that he once more part the chaotic waters and make a way in the desert. Job risks the loss of a moral God by confronting God with his injustice. Jeremiah risks the loss of the covenant by calling out for God to return yet again to a faithless partner and a failed marriage. Matthew and John the Revelator recognize that the coming of Messiah is impelled by the cries of innocent sufferers. Throughout the Bible, lament risks the possible loss of relationship with God and presses for a new, though uncertain, experience of God's presence.

#### The Church in Exile: Being a Missionary to the Dominant Culture - Alban

While lament is not a practice widely utilized in many sectors of today's church, it is the language that gives voice to a sense of loss and allows for the voice of protest to find its generative expression. In congregations throughout North America there is a sense of loss and sorrow that must be given voice. It comes out in church board meetings, informal conversations, and seminary classrooms. The sorrow is found in the cultural realities that remind us that the Christian faith holds less and less influence over the culture. Old certainties are not so certain, old institutions are eroding and carry less attraction to new generations; social fabrics seem to be fraying and are replaced with confusion, frustration, and sometimes anger. There is a lack of clarity about truth, authority, ethics, and what is "right." The church itself struggles (sometimes unsuccessfully) to hold its membership, and finances are an ongoing struggle. These are sorrow-producing realities that are *lamentable*. To properly appropriate the resources of exilic spirituality, the congregation should find ways to lament these changes. There must be a refusal to decorate our marginalization with platitudes or empty complaint. In giving voice to our sadness the church will gain a voice that is honest and realistic, just as the voice of the poet was in Babylon.

According to Luther, as priests and bishops to their children, parents have a twofold task: to nurture the faith of their children and to help them develop their gifts to serve others.10 He also helped parents in this task by preaching about parenting and by writing *The Small Catechism*, which was intended for use in the home.

Followers of Luther also spoke meaningfully about the sacred task of parenting. For example, August Hermann Francke, the eighteenth century German pietist from Halle, claimed that the primary goal of parents is to lead their children to godliness. They are to help children grow in faith, empowering them to use their gifts and talents to love and serve God and the neighbor and to contribute to the common good.11 Formation of children was also emphasized in the recently adopted social statement of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, Our Calling in Education. 12



# 22) Now it takes ever increasing intentionality to get people in the doors

During my 10 2/3 years in the installed pastorate during the 1980s serving an open country two-point parish, mid-week Lenten services at 8pm were offered at each church – one on Wednesday night and the other on Thursday night. The schedule rotated from year to year. I taught Confirmation at 7pm and expected the students and parents to attend the Lenten services. The Congregation Council held their regular meetings following the Lenten services. Circles served a lunch after the Lenten services. Ushers ushered, and acolytes lit the candles. All these activities increased the attendance.

Through the years, I have learned that some people will come if asked to serve in some capacity but will not otherwise. So, at one midsized congregation I served years later in interim ministry, a big part of the church secretary's job was to ask people to serve as ushers, greeters, assisting ministers, acolytes, communion assistants, altar guild, communion bread, coffee fellowship, projection, and recording. When the choir sang, the choir members came. When the praise band played, the members of the praise band came. If there ever was a day when it could be said, "Open the doors, and they will come," that day has passed.

The newcomer telephoned me later to explain that she suffered from Celiac Disease and to ask if a separate cup of wine could be provided also to avoid cross-contamination.

### Celiac Disease, Alcohol Intolerance, and the Church's Pastoral Response

As a best practice, it is recommended that individuals with gluten and/or alcohol intolerance arrange through their parish the purchase any low-gluten hosts or mustum. This facilitates the oversight and good stewardship of the pastor who is responsible as mentioned above. It also "normalizes" the practice for the communicant, as well as keeping the purchase of liturgical supplies together in the parish budget.

## 25) Considerations on the number of services of worship

Invariably, a congregation leader or member in a mid-size or large congregation will suggest cutting back on the number of services of worship. Often, the underlying lament is over declining attendance. Many times, the suggestion does not gain traction, and I simply listen to the concern. But, if the suggestion is taken seriously, I am prepared. I wrote up the following considerations where the suggestion to cut back on gathered worship assemblies had been gaining momentum before I came, and certain people wanted to move on after the previous installed pastor, who was opposed to the idea, took another call.

# Considerations on Gathered Worship Assemblies Pastor Lowell Bolstad

- 1. Jesus commissions the disciples, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirt, and teaching them to observe to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)
- 2. The Apostle Paul states, "I have become all things to all people that I might by all means save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, so that I may share in its blessings." (I Corinthians 9:22b-23)
- 3. The mission statement of this congregation is
  - A congregation of Christ's baptized people being led by the Spirit to serve God within our broader community by: Celebrating the presence of God Cultivating the spiritual growth of all members Caring for the needs of all people, Communicating Christ to all.
- 4. In the early days of the congregation, the assembly convened when a circuit preacher was available. Through the years this congregation fortunately has been able to increase the number of worship assemblies to three a weekend.
- 5. It would be one thing if this congregation was located in a stable or declining homogenous community, but this congregation is a regional church welcoming people from a large area in various circumstances. Decisions about worship schedule are best carried out in keeping in mind, not only members and attenders, but also visitors and guests, in order to reach out to welcome as many people as possible. This is especially true in a region with a large influx of people for weekends, weeks, summers, longer, and year around, which multiplies the population. It would be a big mistake to change a worship schedule simply to satisfy the personal preference of certain members.
- 6. A contraction of the gathered worship assemblies inevitably results in a subtraction of attendance and receipts. People fall through the cracks in attendance, participation, contributions. Cutbacks result in total lower worship attendance, not higher, with a resultant drop in receipts. Even if the decision is looked at simply from a financial perspective, going from two worship assemblies on a Sunday to one decreases the revenue stream. The intent of this congregation to pay off the line of credit and add back staff would become increasingly difficult if the decision is made to contract the number of gathered worship assemblies. Be prepared for a round of budget cutbacks if there is a contraction.
- 7. The present situation of two gathered worship assemblies on a Sunday allows for variety. For instance, on one Sunday, the choir may sing at the early service and the ensemble at the later service.
- 8. Vibrant congregations see their identity more as a mission outpost to reach out to share Jesus with as many people as possible rather than a country club to accommodate the comfort of its members?
- 9. In a day and age when people's lives and schedules are becoming increasingly complicated, a variety of worship offerings in midsize and large congregations seeks to make it possible for as many as possible to come to worship. This is a day and age when people appreciate options especially the younger generations. The days when the church could simply open its doors and expect that people would walk in are over. The church is called to become increasingly strategic. At the same time, many people are creatures of habit and resist a dramatic disruption.
- 10. Any number of congregations in this synod would be glad to have an average worship attendance of 150+ and host 3 worship assemblies.

- 11. Worship assemblies possess different personalities and choreographies. For instance, a Saturday evening worship service may feel like a *chapel* service, while the early morning Sunday service like a *cathedral* service, and the later morning Sunday service like a *camp* service. People are attracted to worship assemblies based on their personality and choreography.
- 12. More than one service allows for more involvement with musicians, ushers, greeters, altar guild, lectors, acolytes, projection, counters, coffee, and others. People come to worship when asked to serve. When the complaint is made that multiple services put a strain on available workers, I encourage exploring creative and adaptive possibilities rather than simply contracting worship assemblies.
- 13. The 80% rule. Whenever the facility approaches 80% average worship attendance capacity, people feel overcrowded, and some quit coming.
- 14. Contracting a worship assembly is like losing a congregation. As a pastor, I do not want to lose a congregation on my watch.
- 15. Some older people or those in special circumstances find it difficult to get up and going early in the morning so appreciate either a Saturday evening service or a later Sunday morning service. The same can be said for people who are on vacation or live some distance away.
- 16. Cutting back on the number of worship assemblies offered may actually create more problems than it solves.
- 17. With a pastor and a student pastor, there is sufficient pastoral staff for preaching and leading worship for three worship assemblies.
- 18. Going to one worship for a special occasion (for instance a pastor's farewell) may bring a large attendance, but over the long haul will result in decreased attendance and giving.
- 19. I encourage a response of being proactive "Move forward" rather than a reactive "Circle the wagons; "purpose driven" rather than "anxiety driven;" "mission ministry" rather than "personal preference."
- 20. Many times, the impetus behind the proposal to cut back on worship services comes from those who remember a previous age when the church felt full. The choice, then, becomes, "Pine for the past or invest in the present?"
- 21. I suggest that keeping a worship service to one hour or less is optimum. This objective becomes increasingly difficult when the various activities normally spread over two Sunday worship services must be included in one service. For instance, there are more people to commune. If some of the following are included it makes for a full service: children's message, noisy offering, choir, ensemble, temple talk, others. This time matter becomes more acute when there is a baptism or affirmation of baptism. It will be very difficult to keep the worship service to one hour when the decision is made to cut back to one Sunday worship service.
- 22. Two Sunday services of worship offer the opportunity for children and adults to come to the first service of worship and then go to educational ministry or go to educational ministry and come to the second service of worship.
- 23. A decision on worship schedule is best made by the Congregation Council. If it is put to a vote at a Congregation Meeting, this action runs the risk of dividing the congregation. Many affected people could be left out of a vote [Saturday people as well as attenders, visitors, guests]. This congregation has suffered through a divisive vote and does not need another potentially divisive vote. Also, surveys of this nature often only reflect the attitudes of those with a personal preference and again run the risk of dividing the congregation.

# Chapter 12.

# **CONGREGATION COUNCIL**

- **C12.04.** The Congregation Council shall have general oversight of the life and activities of this congregation, and in particular its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The duties of the Congregation Council shall include the following:
  - a. To lead this congregation in stating its mission, to do long-range planning, to set goals and priorities, and to evaluate its activities in light of its mission and goals.
  - b. To seek to involve all members of this congregation in worship, learning, witness, service, and support.

In addition to the above, I compiled the following considerations and resources in response to other settings:

1. If the number of worship services is cut back, the question arises of what style of worship will be used.

#### The Best Ways to Get People to Attend Church More Often

Overall, we found that the biggest motivators for weekly attendance are related to convenience and finding value in relationships with leaders and other members of the church community.

Offer a Variety of Worship Options

Twenty-seven percent of survey respondents reported that more options for worship times would motivate them to attend more often.

This makes sense, given that the number of hours Americans work in a week has been <u>ticking upward</u> since the 1970s. And since household chores, schoolwork and <u>extracurricular activities</u> take up much of the remaining time families have together, offering a variety of service times or online options to accommodate members' busy schedules could help increase attendance.

- 3. Sometimes there is a radio or television broadcast. Going from two services of worship on a Sunday to one and changing the times can get complicated for these broadcasts.
- 4. I suggest that starting another service of worship whether it be an evening service on Sunday, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Saturday is preferable to cutting back a Sunday morning service of worship to carry out the goal to "invite and involve." Among the possibilities are the following: Sunday evening service of worship for youth and young adults; Wednesday evening service of worship tied in with the educational ministry during the school year and for those folks to continue to come in the summer [Gone on weekends? We've got a worship service for you on Wednesdays. We'll be waiting for you!], a Thursday evening "cabin" summer service of worship for those going away on weekends; and a Saturday evening summer campfire service of worship ["Want to go camping for the weekend, but don't want to pay the cost of gas? Come to the church's campground. Be sure to attend the campfire service on Saturday @ 9pm!].

Making the decision to add an additional worship service, or even considering such a thing, is a major undertaking in congregational life. As institutions (and even as members of institutions), we don't always embrace even the smallest changes easily, and alterations in our worship styles and patterns are not small changes. Rather, they are often some of the largest changes that congregations choose to undertake. Yet many positive reasons for adding worship opportunities exist:  $\emptyset$  to relieve overcrowding,  $\emptyset$  to grow the congregation, or  $\emptyset$  to offer something entirely new to the members and to individuals outside the congregation. Adding services can provide a wonderful, invigorating climate for growth of all sorts, both individual and institutional. But large-scale change without adequate planning not only may doom the change but also may create additional problems. # 26) Considerations on proposal to close churches to make for one service of worship in one church

If the argument is made that in one congregation, the number of services of worship should go from 3 to 1, what about the argument that in a parish, the parish should go from 3 congregations to 1 congregation with 1 service of worship, 1 Sunday School, and 1 building? The critique behind the proposal often argues that many of these small congregations are not pursuing God's mission in the world anyway but only hanging on to preserve the building or stay with their own until they die and that they are being selfish in insisting on their own congregation when they could simply go to a bigger church with more programs.

The church building in Northeastern Montana in which I was baptized stands empty on the prairie, so I am well aware that many small congregations in the open country may be facing the end of the life cycle. At the same time, I am not willing to agree that urging congregations to close and merge with a larger congregation will necessarily make the combined ministry in the larger congregation that much stronger. My contention is that the total activity and energy of 3 congregations merged into 1 congregation will still be less than 3 congregations cooperating as 1 parish. Many of the considerations in the above scenario are appropriate in this scenario. It cannot be assumed that the people will automatically go to the larger church. Some will fall through the cracks. Some who held important formal or informal roles in the smaller congregations will be sidelined. I am not familiar with individual giving amounts, but my guess is that people in small congregations contribute more to keep going. Will they be as committed to maintain that level of giving after leaving their home church and being assimilated by a larger congregation? I am familiar with people serving in the congregation and wonder if they will continue serving at or above that level when they are assimilated into the larger congregation. Simply assuming that there will then be only one building to maintain is not that simple. Some buildings may be sold. Some may not be worth standing and may be demolished. But, what about the buildings in good condition that are next to a cemetery, for instance, and do not lend themselves to be sold for any purpose the market will bear? A church building is more than a facility in that it serves as a symbol of the presence of the congregation in the neighborhood. A congregation at its best is there for the neighborhood, and the loss of its unifying symbol is felt in the area.

This contraction argument carried to its conclusion could argue that it only makes sense to keep open a handful of congregations in a geographical area that show promise and then close the rest so that people can go from a smaller congregation to one of the larger congregations. The Roman Catholics can do this because of the power given to the bishop, but, at least in my tribe of Lutherans, members hold a stronger sense of congregation autonomy.

For my part, as an interim pastor, the last thing I want to be known as is an agent of the synod sent to close churches because of mainline decline and the clergy shortage. If the people come to the realization that the ministry is no longer sustainable, I am willing to continue the conversation, but I am not interested in pushing a preconceived notion of what is best for them.

#### 27) When the unthinkable happens

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In the <u>public statement</u> I made June 18, the day after the shooting in Charleston, S.C., I called for a day of repentance and mourning. I would like that day for the ELCA to be this Sunday, June 28.

The worship staff of the churchwide organization has developed a "<u>Service of Prayer in Remembrance</u>" for your use this Sunday. I hope you will have an opportunity to use significant portions (if not all) of this liturgy this Sunday.

I also want to encourage you to share with your congregations, ideally from the pulpit during Sunday's worship, the June 18 public statement. You might also wish to insert it into bulletins, duplicate it as a handout and/or post it on your congregation's website.

The members of this church, no matter where they are located, must think about, discuss and deal with this crucial issue of justice and compassion. It is the church's work. God's intention for all humanity is that we see the intrinsic worth, dignity and value of all people. Racism undermines the promise of community and fractures authentic relationships with one another. We need to talk, and we need to listen, but we also need to act and speak out against inequity. Look with newly opened eyes at the many subtle and overt ways that racism infects and affects our communities. Above all pray – for insight, for forgiveness, for courage.

I thank God for your faithful service to the gospel and God's work, and I thank you for your partnership in helping all of us address the sin of racism.

# 31) Primary role of church musicians is to support assembly singing

Jay Beech in a presentation entitled, *So, now we have to be INNOVATIVE, too?* as a part of the Mid-Winter Convocation 2013 *Worship in a Time of Change* at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota stated, "The primary role of church musicians is to support assembly singing." He also shared his worship planning values list: word and sacrament as foundational; respect for the liturgy; church year and the lectionary, theological content, congregational participation and dialog, and cultural context (liturgical inculturation).

# 32) Praise bands: performative or participative?

Through the years, I have served assignments where praise bands have played once a month in some congregations, every weekend in other congregations, and more than once a month but less than every weekend in other congregations. One indicator for me of whether a *member* of a praise band views their musicianship as performative or participative is attendance at services of worship on those weeks when the band does not play. When a band *member* only shows up to play (perform), but not to worship (participate) on other occasions, that tells me that, at least for that *member*, the band is more performative than participative.

#### The Challenge of Modern/Postmodern Culture – Let's Talk

...we cannot bracket the fact that much contemporary Christian music is written for soloists and ensembles and that this kind of music has not often worked well for congregational singing. We cannot bracket the fact that much of this music is intended to be disposable and therefore has limited value for long-term faith formation. We cannot bracket the fact many of the lyrics reinforce a personal relationship with God, couched in the first personal pronoun, and therefore do not communicate the doctrines of the faith. We cannot bracket the fact that the lyrics of many of the songs express a personal devotion to Jesus but not the public praise of the Holy Trinity. We cannot bracket the fact that the order of worship promulgated in Pentecostal traditions such as the Vineyard and adopted in many mainline churches aims at bringing individuals into a personal, intimate relationship with God (even Holy Communion is used for this purpose) rather than celebrating word and sacrament as means of grace and expressing liturgically the response of the community of faith.

6. Contemporary worship music is ordinarily accompanied by Praise Teams, and these have frequently (but by no means always) been problematic. It has been difficult to provide direction to them, due to the inherent confusion between whether they are participants in the congregation or performers for the congregation. ## 34) Gathering-Word-Meal-Sending or Music-Message

An assignment ended 4/15/2020, and the next assignment I was scheduled to start 4/16 fell through, so I ended up on leave from call during the rest of the COVID-19 lockdown of the economy and lockout of the congregants. In June some of the churches opened up, while most ELCA churches kept their doors locked, so I went to a Wesleyan service of worship on 6/14. The band played music for 15 minutes while the people stood and clapped their hands and waved their arms. After a few announcements, the pastor preached for 50 minutes using projection and props and kept their attention. The order of service was different than I was accustomed to, but I have to admit that most of the people looked under 50, while most of the people at the liturgical congregations I served looked over 50.

# 35) Respect for those in attendance no matter how many

One venue offered bands each Friday night at 7pm. Normally, there were only a handful of people to begin the evening, but the number usually picked up as the night wore on. One local band started late, made sarcastic comments like, "Don't all rush the stage at the same time," and talked to themselves in an extended fashion between songs. Another band, interestingly from a large city, could have taken the same approach but did not. They started on time, played with enthusiasm, and kept the songs coming.

# 36) Who shall preside at Holy Communion?

At one setting, I had arranged for a member of the congregation to lead a Service of the Word upon my absence, while a special speaker from one of the partner agencies gave the message. When I came back, I learned that the member presided at Holy Communion. Upon further digging into the background of the congregation, I discovered that the previous pastor affiliated with WordAlone authorized members to preside at Holy Communion in a Lay Presidency Letter sent to assisting ministers.

It just so happens that you drew this week for being the assisting minister in worship on Sunday. Our policy has been to aid our guest preachers by covering the rest of our service with lay ministers. Some of our assisting ministers have been rather anxious when it came to "doing" communion. I don't know if that's the case for you or not. Whatever the case may be, this letter is mainly to give you some encouragement and rationale, so you can be clear about what you are doing on the Sundays when I am gone, as well as what you are doing as an Assisting Minister in general.

First of all, as I have said numerous times already: when it comes to communion there is nothing magical about what I do or say or who I am as "The Pastor." A traditionally Lutheran approach to communion is different from say, the Roman Catholics or Episcopalians. For them, it is all about the priest, of course. For them, Jesus' presence doesn't happen unless the right person saying the right words while wearing the right clothing and making the right hand gestures does it all rightly. But what that means is that "the people" can't receive the assuring presence of God unless they go through the priest. For traditional Lutherans, that's poppycock. In fact, in some sense the heart and soul of the Gospel revealed in Jesus Christ is that

we no longer are reliant on others to intercede on our behalf before God. It is Jesus himself who does that and not some priest. In Jesus, there is a restoration of the relationship enjoyed between humanity and their Creator in the Garden, when we are told that the Lord God would come walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze (Gen. 3:8).

Second, the way that Holy Communion happens – the way that Jesus is made present for those who come forward – is simply through the words that you proclaim, and that the congregation hears and believes. This is what Luther's Small Catechism reminds us about communion:

What benefits do we receive from this sacrament?

The benefits of this sacrament are pointed out by the words, '...given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sin.' These words assure us that in the sacrament we receive forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. For where there is forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation.

How can eating and drinking do all this?

It is not eating and drinking that does this, but the words, '...given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sin. These words, along with the eating and drinking are the main thing in the sacrament. And whoever believes these words has exactly what they say, forgiveness of sins.

See? It's not hocus pocus that makes communion communion. It's not about you or me doing the right incantation to summon the spirits. It's simply about telling the congregation the Good News. "God loves you so much that He gave His Son Jesus Christ for YOU... this IS the Blood of Christ for YOU." And don't you know, there are people literally DYING to know and to believe that God is for theme and with them even when they can't see that in their daily lives!

St. Paul says about such matters:... (Romans 10:5-15, 17).

"Faith comes by hearing," Paul says. That is what we do when we lead the congregation in the Service of Communion: we are proclaiming the "word of Christ." No magic. No special authorization. Just pure proclamation that God loves you and forgives you in Jesus. See?

Make sure you keep these things in mind when you preside on Sunday. One the one hand, I want you to take it take it seriously. It is no small task to be the proclaimer of God's grace. There are lots of things that can get in the way on Sundays that would hinder that proclamation – your external demeanor, the way you dress, the attitude with which you speak the liturgy, your age (I know there are some who have been hindered by the high school you who have presided at The Supper.), etc.

On the other hand, God's grace isn't dependent on the individual presiding over the liturgy. Can you imagine how little of God's grace would be bestowed if communion was dependent on how righteous, how good, how holy, how precise the person presiding at communion was? Hopefully, then, that mystery of faith gives both peace and confidence to do what you have been called to do this weekend....

That's the Gospel, and it's not up to or dependent on you. You're the tool. You're the vessel. But it is God in Christ who is the actor, the forgiver, the up-lifter.

I brought up the bishop's message addressing this matter to the Congregation Council and met stiff resistance.

#### A Message from Bishop Pederson

September 22, 2008

# Colleagues,

From time to time, I receive requests from pastors/congregation asking that a lay person be authorized to president at Holy Communion during the short-term absence of the pastor. In our polity, only synodical bishops can grant this authorization. I have sometimes granted such requests primarily because I had not clarified for myself the circumstances under which such authorization is appropriate; and, when I have provided such authorization, I have done so with some discomfort. A recent request "pushed" me to do the clarification that I should have done earlier in my time as bishop, a clarification that I want to share with those of you who hold the Office of Word and Sacrament.

To honor the Office of Word and Sacrament and those who are specifically trained and called to this office, and to respect our relationship with the whole church and the guidance of the Conference of Bishops, I will only authorize presiding at Holy Communion in long-term circumstances where it is not possible to secure an ordained pastor or a pastor from an ecumenical partner with whom we share full-communion. Therefore, the occasional, short-term absence of a pastor would not qualify for such authorization. When the pastor is absent occasionally or for the short-term, laity should lead worship using an order of service that does not include sacraments.

I am fully aware that many congregations include Holy Communion as part of their worship every Sunday, a frequency I applaud. I am also aware that capable, theologically faithful lay persons are part of every congregation. I am also aware that some of these lay persons may have been authorized to preside at Holy Communion in the past for various reasons. However, to uphold the integrity of the pastoral office of Word and Sacrament, I will only authorize presiding at the Table in long-term ministry contexts where it is virtually impossible for an ordained pastor to be present at worship to give sacramental leadership.

If you wish to read the consensus of the church on this matter and the background for my clarification, please refer to the Manual of Policies and Procedures for Management of the Rosters under "Managing your rosters," pages 53-55, page 55 in particular.

A. To affirm the policies and guidelines of this church on synodically authorized ministries as stated in the bylaws, in "Policy and Guidelines Related to Synodically Authorized Ministries of Word and Sacrament" as revised, and in Use of the Means of Grace, and to encourage and support one another in applying and interpreting these policies.

B. To affirm that synodically authorized ministry policies are intended to honor the God-given office of Word and Sacrament (Article V, The Augsburg Confession) and this church's commitment to ordained ministry as the primary means for fulfilling this office. Synodically authorized ministry is intended to assist this church to respond pastorally and effectively to emerging opportunities in Christ's mission where it is not possible to provide an ordained minister of Word and Sacrament.

C. To affirm that when addressing the need for Word and Sacrament ministry in a congregation or other ministry where an ordained minister of this church is not available, that synods will seek the utilization of an ordained minister of a full-

communion partner church, under the guidelines related to the orderly exchange of ordained ministers.

D. To affirm that synodically authorized ministry of Word and Sacrament is normally intended for a specific congregation or other ministry where appropriate ordained ministry is not available for an extended period of time.

E. To agree that, in keeping with the policies of this church, synodically authorized ministry of Word and Sacrament is not intended for and should not be used to authorize an individual to provide for short-term, intermittent absences of a specific congregation's called pastor. However, we acknowledge that there is often need to provide for the celebration of the sacrament for such circumstances, and we acknowledge that in some areas and at some times neither an ELCA nor a full-communion partner church ordained minister is available to meet such a need. Such situations highlight a tension between a bishop's authority to provide for "appropriate ordained pastoral leadership" (7.61.01.) and the guideline that authorization is only to be used when the need for such leadership is "for an extended period of time" (Use of the Means of Grace, Principle

We agree that for congregations in such areas, the inability to provide "appropriate ordained pastoral leadership" may require flexibility in interpreting "for an extended period of time." This flexibility may be accomplished for a transitional period by the authorization of a person or persons to be available to provide Word and Sacrament ministry in congregations in the area where ordained leadership is chronically unavailable.

Authorization would be for a renewable term not to exceed one year and for the specific area. Like all synodically authorized ministers, such persons would be appropriately prepared and supervised. Though authorized for an area and for a term, such persons would only serve in specific ministry settings with the approval of the bishop. The synod should continue to seek ways to make available ordained ministers to serve in that area.

F. To affirm that this church's policies and commitments name four clear aspects in synodically authorized ministry: an invitation to service, the preparation of persons to serve, supervision and accountability, and authorization for specific service. All four aspects are vital to faithful use of synodically authorized ministries.

- 1. We agree to hold one another accountable for the ongoing recruitment of candidates for the ordained and rostered lay ministries of this church.
- 2. We encourage congregations and other ministries to enhance the mission-effectiveness of the policies and guidelines by commending to the bishop persons who should be prepared for possible service in synodically authorized ministry.
- 3. We encourage bishops and synods to plan for the preparation of persons to meet anticipated and unanticipated mission opportunities of that synod.
- 4. We commit ourselves to seek always to authorize for ministry only individuals who have been well prepared and who will serve under supervision.
- 1. We will encourage congregations and other ministries to become aware of these guidelines and, in collaboration with the synod, to seek to anticipate their own mission needs and opportunities and to plan for them.

## Lay presidency - Wikipedia

Lay presidency is a form of celebrating the Lord's Supper (sometimes called the Eucharist) whereby the person presiding over the sacrament is not an ordained minister of religion. Similarly, when the celebrant is a deacon rather than a presbyter, the term diaconal presidency is used.

Most independent Christian churches have a form of lay presidency as part of their communal worship. Mainstream denominations have been less inclined to allow lay people to preside over the sacrament, preferring to use ordained ministers or priests for this role.

I served a congregation that had been in a shared ministry agreement. The other congregation left the shared ministry agreement to enter into a letter of agreement with another congregation. I agreed to stay on for the time being. The Transition Task Force explored the options for leadership of the services of worship after I left and before a settled pastor came on board as a solo pastorate or in a shared ministry agreement with another congregation. A retired pastor on the task force proposed a rotation of supply preachers and non-ordained persons leading worship. The congregation was in the habit of Holy Communion each week. I contacted the synod office, which in turn asked for guidance from churchwide. The staff at churchwide provided the following:

# THE HOLY COMMUNION TAKES PLACE IN THE ASSEMBLY

39 The gathered people of God celebrate the sacrament. Holy Communion, usually celebrated within a congregation, also may be celebrated in synodical, churchwide, and other settings where the baptized gather.

Application 39A Authorization for all celebrations of Communion in a parish setting where there is a called and ordained minister of Word and Sacrament is the responsibility of the pastor in consultation with the Congregation Council. Application 39B In established centers of this church—e.g., seminaries, colleges, retreat centers, charitable institutions, and administrative centers— authorization for the celebration of Holy Communion shall be given, either for a limited or unlimited time, by the presiding bishop of this church or, where only one synod is concerned, by the bishop of that synod. Application 39C In institutions not formally associated with this church—e.g., hospitals, retirement homes, colleges and universities, or military bases—where there is a called pastor or chaplain, authorization for the celebration of Holy Communion rests with the pastor in consultation with the appropriate calling-sending expression of this church. 6 Background 39D The authorizing role of bishops is a sign of our interconnectedness. This church provides for ministry in many settings. Chaplains, for example, bring the means of grace to people in institution s on behalf of the whole Church.

# A PASTOR PRESIDES AT THE HOLY COMMUNIO N

40 In witness that this sacrament is a celebration of the Church, serving its unity, an ordained minister presides in the service of Holy Communion and proclaims the Great Thanksgiving. Where it is not possible for an extended period of time to provide ordained pastoral leadership, a synodical bishop may authorize a properly trained lay person to preside for a specified period of time and in a given location only.7° Background 40A "In the celebration of the eucharist, Christ gathers, teaches and nourishes the church. It is Christ who invites to the meal and who presides at it. He is the shepherd who leads the people of God, the prophet who announces the Word of God, the priest who celebrates the mystery of God. In most churches, this presidency is signified by a n ordained minister. The one who presides at the eucharistic celebration in the name of Christ makes clear that the rite is not the assembly's own creation or possession; the eucharist is received as a gift from Christ living in his church. The minister of the eucharist is the ambassador who represent s the divine initiative and expresses the connection of the local community with other local communities in the universal Church."7'

# LAY ASSISTING MINISTERS SERVE IN MANY ROLES

41 Designated and trained lay persons serve in a variety of leadership roles in the Eucharist. Among these assisting ministers will be readers, interpreters, cantors, musicians and choir members, servers of communion, acolytes, leaders of prayer, those who prepare for the meal, and those who offer hospitality.72

Background 4IA "The liturgy is the celebration of all who gather. Together with the pastor who presides, the entire congregation is involved. It is important, therefore, that lay persons fulfill appropriate ministries within the service."73

I ran across the following guidelines offered by Bishop John Stanley Macholz.

#### Guidelines for when no ordained person is available to preside

These guidelines continue to be a working document and an invitation to conversation as together we struggle with a shortage of ordained persons to provide pastoral coverage in Upstate New York congregations. More and more of our congregations have moved to weekly Eucharist and some have mid-week services as well. The needs and traditions vary from place to place across the synod. These guidelines do not represent a change in the way we have been operating and are consistent both with the tradition in this synod and the ELCA policies. I continue to believe that this is not a matter of "rights and privileges" so much as "for good order" and for the sake of the mission of the church. Constitutionally it falls to me, as Bishop, to make these decisions. I do not tend toward legalism and I recognize that there are some gray areas

and a fair amount of disagreement among us on these issues. Even so, I ask for the full cooperation of all rostered and congregational leaders in these matters.

#### 37) Let the liturgy do its work

The congregation I was serving at the time went together with a neighboring congregation for joint mid-week Lenten services. One pastor preached the sermon, while the other led the liturgy. I preached on the parable on the Good Samaritan at one service. At the Blessing as a part of the Sending part of the worship, the other pastor started out by saying, "How many of us would have walked on by like the priest and the Levite?" The pastor proceeded to make the Blessing an exhortation to do good deeds. I believe there is power in the liturgy and that there is no need for me to interject added commentary.

#### 38) Is all this acclamation by applause necessary?

As an interim pastor, I seek to respect services of worship traditions of the settings into which I enter. So, when the congregation is used to acclamation by applause, I realize it does little good to quote Luke 17:10, So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, "We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!" Having said that, I do have concerns that its increasing use falls under the "everyone gets a trophy" self-esteem category, which results in the practice being trivialized. At the very least, I do not encourage its practice any more than already being used. This matter is best addressed in long-term worship planning and education. The music composer J. S. Bach believed in "To the Glory of God Alone."

#### 41) Name names?

I served a two-point parish where the previous pastor preferred for the people in the assembly to name names of those in need during the prayers of intercession. One of the congregations realigned with another congregation. I stayed on as the remaining congregation

aligned with still another congregation. The first Sunday I was approached by members of the Worship Committee who wanted me name names during the prayers of intercession and gave me a list of names to pray for.

At the very least, I want to know that the person being prayed for has given permission to have their name used. I remember early on in my pastoral ministry an older woman who lived alone in the countryside and who did not want her name included in the prayers when she went to the hospital as that would make public that her house was for the moment unoccupied. Also, when the service of worship is broadcast, I prefer to use only first names.

#### 42) Be careful what you pray for

A congregation I served went through a split 12 years earlier in which a 1/3 of the congregation walked out and formed a Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC) congregation 8 blocks away. Some of the people who left made harsh statements in leaving so that even after that long there were raw feelings in the congregation towards those who left.

The 4th Sunday in January I offered a Service of Prayer for Christian Unity as a part of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity as I had done previous years in other congregations. I commended the congregation in my message for its efforts to involve other congregations and people in the community in joint efforts. I also lifted the joint services of worship with the Methodists and Episcopalians. I talked about the local ministerial meeting and working together.

The following week a former member who left during the split to become a part of the new LCMC congregation died. This person was well liked in the community. A member of the congregation I was serving related that he did not know to that day exactly why the man left. A member of the choir of the congregation I was serving proposed to a member of the choir at the LCMC congregation that they practice together and sing together at the funeral at the LCMC church. The choir members from the LCMC congregation came over to the ELCA congregation to practice on Wednesday and then sang at the funeral at the LCMC congregation the following Saturday.

# 43) Recommendations of a consultant

A congregation retained the Church Doctor to make recommendations on the various areas of life and mission of the congregation before I came. These recommendations informed my interim ministry in that congregation. Following are recommendations for worship:

I recommend you conduct research among those who attend the different worship services.

I recommend you ask them to fill out a very small questionnaire that would ask them which service they attend and then to ask them to check one of the following answers as to the primary reason "why?" Time\_\_\_\_ Style \_\_\_\_

I recommend you encourage all members to honor the different heart languages of people as they worship in different ways. I recommend you help people recognize that each person does not have to like every style of worship, but they do have to respect and honor the different ways that people worship. The truth is that Lutherans worship in different styles all over the world. In the contemporary service, I recommend you use the keyboard.

I recommend you provide some songs with a piano and some with electronic keyboard.

I recommend you provide a unique choir designated primarily for the 9:30am worship service made up of children and parents together.

I recommend they sing child friendly worship songs as a choir for that service.

I recommend as you start this additional choir that you recognize one of the ways to grow a healthy church is to continually start new groups.

I recommend you do not change the worship schedule for services during the seasons. Continuity throughout the year strengthens and builds.

I recommend you worship twice a year together at one place at one time.

I recommend this be an off-campus location on a neutral site, like the high school auditorium.

I recommend this be a "bring-a-friend" Sunday.

I recommend this be highly publicized as an outreach to your community.

I recommend a core team of people be developed for ministry during worship times.

I recommend they be uniquely chosen for their gifts and personalities.

I recommend they be assigned to the sole purpose of ministering and reaching out to those who are alone, in need, or new.

I recommend a mentality be established that anytime ministry is conducted, the person who is doing that ministry be training and equipping another person for ministry. For example, when ushers are ushering, I recommend they see, as a part of their own personal responsibility, the ministry of developing another usher in training.

# 44) Worship Committee

In my Review by synod of constitutions for congregations of the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin, I come across various descriptions of duties for committees and teams. The following is one such Continuing Resolution for a Worship Committee:

- a. The duties of the *Worship Ministry Committee* include the following:
  - 1) To give leadership, counsel, and guidance in all matters pertaining to worship, including assisting ministers, altar guild, communion stewards, acolytes, readers, greeters, ushers, media, and church music within the congregation.
  - 2) To maintain an adequate supply of expendable items for worship, such as communion cards, pencils, communion wine and bread, baptism napkins, candles, and other items, as needed for and contributing to regular and special services of worship.
  - 3) To be responsible for preparation of the altar, assistance with communion serving, and care for all paraments and vestments.
  - 4) To consult with the pastor and work with the Congregation Council relative to music staff.
  - 5) To establish criteria for music to be used in services of worship and at weddings and funerals, with counsel and cooperation of the pastor and music staff.
  - 6) To recruit and develop musical talent for present and future services of worship.
  - 7) To serve as the congregation's link to synod and churchwide ministries on worship and church music.
  - 8) To report regularly to the Congregation Council on its activities and to the congregation at the annual meeting.
  - 9) To convene at least once each year a meeting of all ministries to meet jointly with the Congregation Council to review the life, work, and program of the congregation.
  - 10) To establish an annual budget for worship materials.
  - 11) To submit a report for annual report.
  - 12) To decorate worship areas for seasons and holidays.

The Congregation Council shall have general oversight of the life and activities of this congregation, and in particular its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The duties of the Congregation Council shall include the following:

- a. To lead this congregation in stating its mission, to do long-range planning, to set goals and priorities, and to evaluate its activities in light of its mission and goals.
- b. To seek to involve all members of this congregation in worship, learning, witness, service, and support.

My thought is that council leadership can talk with people informally and come to a decision rather than expecting some sort of consensus to emerge from a survey.

# 46) Who picks the hymns?

The two organists and two members of the Worship Committee asked to talk with me after the first service of worship during a bridge assignment. "Pastor," one asked, "How do you handle hymn selection?" I asked how it had been done. I was told the previous pastor was in declining health and all too happy to delegate that task to the organists and members of the Worship Committee. Especially the one organist - who was developing tremors but insisted on continuing to play - preferred tunes with no more than two sharps and flats. At the next bridge assignment, the organist said she met with the interim pastor to pick out hymns for three months at a time. In both settings, they understood why I chose to select the hymns to match the theme or emphasis of the day. For my part, I gained a better understanding that the musicians wanted hymns that were both playable and singable. No accompanist wants to be embarrassed by being asked to play a tune that is out of their comfort zone, nor does an accompanist want to play a tune that no one can sing.

#### 47) Without accompaniment

The 2 congregations, one open country and the other village, had been served by the same organist for 30+ years, but when they realigned, the organist stayed with her home congregation and relinquished her position at the other congregation. The church secretary located a pianist to play 2 Sundays a month. The other Sundays, I led the singing. The next parish I went to, the organist was in her 70s and could not find anyone to accompany when she went on vacation. I led the singing at that service of worship. The next parish after that, one of the congregations did not have a regular accompanist, so I led the singing. One of the results I have discovered in leading and singing without accompaniment is that the assembly sings louder as it is not dependent upon accompaniment.

#### 48) Recorded message and/or music

A substitute pianist did not show one Sunday. I led the singing. The primary sound engineer, (who was also gone that day), said afterwards that it was possible for the organist to pre-record the songs on a disc for the organ and have them played during the service of worship. When I attended another Lutheran congregation on an allotted vacation Sunday, I saw the organ but no organist. Then, the organ started playing. I looked over and saw an older woman pressing the keys on a laptop computer to make the organ play. A couple years later, I served an open country congregation, which had purchased a Clavinova to use when the organist was not playing. Though I prefer live music and live preaching and do not advocate recordings or projection in worship, I wonder if there will come the day when, because of a shortage of pastors and musicians, a pastor will serve a circuit of congregations where at least some Sundays the message and/or the music will be pre-recorded. It takes me back to the day when I started out in the pastoral ministry in 1980 at an open-country two-point parish when the members told me they "were just getting used to coming to worship every Sunday." They referred to their history when they were part of a circuit where they took turns with other congregations in having a pastor available to lead the services of worship. Technology could conceivably make it possible for a pastor to serve a circuit and for people to come to the services of worship each Sunday. In addition to preaching on those Sundays, the ordained pastor would administer the sacraments.

#### 'Virtual preaching' transforms Sunday sermons - CNN.com

It may not be a better way, though, said the Rev. Thomas Long, a nationally recognized authority on preaching and author of "Preaching from Memory to Hope."

Preachers who don't think they need to be physically present in their church should ask how they would feel if they were forced to preach to high-def images of their congregation every Sunday morning, said Long, Bandy Professor of Preaching at Emory University.

"There's something about embodiment - that the person who delivers the sermon is actually there – that's important," Long said. "It's important in the same way that someone physically visits someone in a hospital or buries a loved one - they don't fax it in."

Long said the New Testament accounts of Jesus' interaction with people show him constantly touching and being physically present with people.

"We don't think God sent a message to us; God sent a person and the word became flesh," he said.

#### 50) Whose needs are being served?

One change in the style of worship back in the 1970s was to move away from the altar against the wall and to a free-standing altar. One graduate from a seminary, which identifies itself as a "worship-centered community", determined when he accepted his first call to an open country congregation in one of the Plains states to do just that. # 51) Two streams of congregation music

I find the insights of Two Streams of Congregational Music - John Ylvisaker based on the reforms of Martin Luther helpful in understanding the need for both formal and folk.

The musical topic most interesting to Lutheran composer <u>John Ylvisaker</u> is the reuse of traditional tunes. He notes that there is a strong tradition for tune-borrowing in Lutheranism, as Martin Luther was "real good at it."

Ylvisaker, a member of <u>St. Paul Lutheran Church</u>, Waverly, Iowa, leads workshops and has written articles on the practice of borrowing melodies from bygone cultures and compositions. Despite that, it came as a surprise when, 15 years after writing "I Was There to Hear Your Borning Cry," Ylvisaker learned he may have unknowingly borrowed the tune.

"We were at an anniversary celebration for some friends, and their kids had put together a video of their life," he said. "There was some music in the back of it, and I thought, that's 'Borning Cry.' But it was Duke Ellington's 'Don't Get Around Much Anymore' .... It's the same six notes that start 'Borning Cry."

# Two Streams of Congregational Music - John Ylvisaker

Martin Luther introduced the German language into the worship life and also paraphrased the liturgy and psalms into songs that could be easily sung by everyone. This was an attempt to not only involve the people in worship, but also to get them to come back after he removed the main reason why anybody went to church. By attacking the Pope's indulgence and merit systems, one of which was that simple church attendance could gain you favor or knock years off your stay in purgatory, Luther was also removing the main reason people went to church. To encourage their attendance, he made the Mass more accessible to them. However, on the high feast days, he continued the practice of the formal Latin Mass.

#### 54) What about projection?

In worship settings that use projection, I am reminded of the couple sitting at a booth in a restaurant, where one is reading the newspaper and the other looking at the smart phone. There is no eye contact. In the service of worship, the leader is looking at the worship book, and the assembly is looking at the screen. The greatest disconnect for me is when I announce the absolution and the assembly stares at the words on the screen. While I respect the traditions of the congregations I serve, I am relieved that most of the congregations I am asked to serve do not use projection. Screens may aid education, but I hold reservations about projection in services of worship and therefore do not encourage its use.

Second, worship invites us from hyper-connectivity to a balance of work and rest. Jaron Lanier is a computer scientist and pioneer in digital media. In his book, *You Are Not a Gadget,* he writes: "When developers of digital technologies design a program that requires you to interact with a computer as if it were a person, they ask you to accept in some corner of your brain that you might also be conceived of as a program."

The new normal is that most people are never "unplugged" from technology. Smart phones lie on the table next to us at dinner. It isn't unusual for someone to go on Facebook or do something online when a meeting or class gets boring. The ping to a text, email or update gives a dose of dopamine to our brains.

A 2011 study revealed that 80% of vacationers bring along laptops or smartphones so they can check in with work. A president of an ad agency commented: "When someone started carrying their own communication and telecommunications devices on their bodies, the boundaries between work and life collapsed."

The distinctions between work and rest – central to Jewish and Christian understandings of worship – are breaking down. And studies are showing that this hyper-connectivity is bringing stress to our lives. Should we consider worship on the Lord's Day as the primary "spiritual practice" for Christians? A fast from technology? If people are losing the ability to unplug and reflect on their lives, can worship teach new spiritual patters and forum us in alternate ways? Can the gospel be a countercultural message in our time, reminding us that our identity is who we *are*, not in what we *do* to fill up every spare moment.

# PowerPointless: Video screens in worship | The Christian Century

In recent years, PowerPoint has become a dominant force in worshiping communities across the theological and liturgical spectrum. In churches smitten with the Microsoft wonder, its power to affect the sensibilities of worshipers and thus to shape congregational identity is almost never discussed.

A tacit assumption is that PowerPoint computer presentations are merely a means to an end, a value-neutral tool used for innocent, perhaps even noble purposes: enlarging text for the hard of seeing; reducing the demand for and thus the production of printed materials; and bringing younger people, who spend much of their lives in front of screens—TV, computer, cell phone, PDA—into worship. But PowerPoint is not value-neutral. As information design analyst Edward Tufte has argued,

PowerPoint promotes a kind of cognitive style that routinely disrupts, dominates, and trivializes content.

# Shhh! Don't tell anyone we're here...

We are different. We don't use screens. We believe that with all of the technology in our – everything from computers and laptops to tablets and smart phones – people are hungry for something that is different from their everyday experience. People are hungering for a sense of something "other." We encourage people to "unplug" for a while so they can sense the Spirit moving in and around people in community.

We are different. We use a hymnal. Hymnals aid the assembly's ability to sing. It allows you to see more than just the words. It allows you to sing parts. Hymnals allow parents to move their finger along with the words so that their child can learn to read music. With a hymnal, you are free to explore; read the psalms, discover the prayers, learn more about the church year and the assigned lectionary readings. Hymnals are tools to help us grow in our faith.

We are different. We don't categorize our music as 'contemporary' or 'traditional'. Music is done well with a variety of instruments: pipe organ, timpani, clarinet, trumpet, bassoon, violin, flute, bass, trombone, piano, and more. We use the instruments the music calls for which aid the assembly in singing.
