

It's time to tell the story!

I get to read a lot of newsletters-a task I like because it's always interesting to see what's going on around the synod. The other day while scanning a publication, I noticed this quote from Corrie Ten Boom, "Security is having the Word of God in your own language. Peace is having the Word of God in your heart." My immediate reaction was to add these words: "Mission is sharing the Word of God with others." A little further down the page in the newsletter the following plea appeared, "Lord, walk beside me with your arm over my shoulder and your hand over my mouth." I murmured to myself, "how very Lutheran (or Midwestern or whatever it is that makes us reluctant to speak out-even to share the Good News of Jesus Christ)!"

It's time to tell the story-and that's precisely what this new publication *God's Work. Our Hands* is intended to do! Many people throughout our synod are busy doing God's work with their hands. Let's share those stories! Let's tell everyone how God's everpresent love is manifested through our efforts, large and small. When you bake cookies and ship them off to a college student who is away from home for the first time; when you take time to visit the elderly neighbor who recently lost a spouse; when you rake a lawn with your youth group; or read a Bible story to your grandchild, you are doing God's work and I want to share your story. Years ago, a friend of mine commented, "There are two kinds of people-those who do the work and those who talk about it." I'm not sure I agree. I'd like to think that those who do the work can also be those who talk about it. Let's set aside our

Lutheran/Midwestern modesty and talk about it. Why? Not because it lifts us up, but because it lifts others to hear the stories, to realize that God is indeed among us, working through us, because there are no hands but ours. Part of the "work" involves sharing the story so others may know that God's love surrounds us on a daily basis, even in the mundane chores. What about the quotes from that newsletter? Maybe we should change the message to "Lord, walk beside me with your arm over my shoulder and give me the words to say so others will know you, too!"



In this parable, the tax collector who repents goes home justified, while the proud Pharisee does not. The parable reminds us that we, too, who repent are justified through Christ. The service includes an Imposition of Ashes, readings from Scripture, a sermon and thematic hymns, as well as Holy Communion that help us to remember that we receive justification only in Christ. Supper is served at 6pm, and the service is at 7pm.

First Sunday in Lent on February 22 to focus on temptation of Jesus

On Ash Wednesday, the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. The First Sunday in Lent tells how the Spirit that comes upon Jesus at his baptism sustains him when he is tested by Satan so that he might proclaim the good news of God's reign.

Easter Message

I walked slowly down the hall to Vera's room. It was the day before Easter and I had spent much of Holy Week bringing Communion to my church's shut-ins. But I had not yet crossed Vera off of my list. Vera was in our local hospital, and Vera was dying. Perhaps this is why I waited to see her last. Pastors aren't supposed to have favorites, but I always have, and Vera was one of my favorites. I didn't want her to die.

As I sat by Vera's hospital bed, I confessed that I didn't have my Easter sermon done yet, and even worse I told her, I really didn't like writing Easter sermons. "Everybody knows the story," I told her as I held onto her withered fingers, "and I never know what else to say."

It was time for Vera to become her pastor's pastor. "You have to tell them the story, because some of them have never heard it." Her tired eyes shone, and her face began to smile. "Pastor, so many people need to hear that story. Just tell them what happened on Easter."

And then she closed those shining eyes. She was tired, and I was just sad. I watched and listened as her breathing grew deeper. How long will she sleep I wondered, and should I stay until she wakes? I continued to hold on to those worn hands. And then her eyes opened.

"Pastor, promise me you'll tell them the story." I wanted to say yes, but I could only nod, because the words caught in my throat as tears ran from my eyes. "You'll do fine," she said. "You always do."

Vera died a few days later, and as I sat with her family I remember asking if we could sing a song at her funeral that I thought they knew. They thought it would be nice. "Mom liked that song."

And, so, we sang,

I love to tell the story; 'tis pleasant to repeat What seems, each time I tell it, more wonderfully sweet. I love to tell the story, for some have never heard The message of salvation from God's own holy Word. I love to tell the story, 'twill be my theme in glory, To tell the old, old story of Jesus and His love. I love to tell the story, for those who know it best Seem hungering and thirsting to hear it like the rest. And when, in scenes of glory, I sing the new, new song, 'Twill be the old, old story that I have loved so long.

It's a good story. Have a blessed Easter. Bishop Rick Hovme.

Commemoration of Luke, Evangelist on October 18

From the Pastor

What's So Lutheran about Worship?

"Praise the Lord! Sing to the Lord a new song, his praise in the assembly of the faithful! (Psalm 149:1)

During this new 21st century, as the church seeks a variety in worship formats, what insights does the Reformation give to us? Martin Luther, on the one hand, retained the order of liturgy that had served the church so well down through the centuries. On the other hand, he put the worship service into the language of the people and used popular folk tunes for his songs.

As church musician John Ylvisaker stated in a recent workshop here in this synod that Luther used a high/low approach to worship planning in that there was a high level of formality for the festival days with the classical liturgy and a low approach with a folk mass for other times. Ylvisaker commended this approach for the church today.

Luther rejected the radical approach of the Anabaptists who would strip the worship service of anything that sounded like the classical liturgy. In our day, this approach is making inroads even in Lutheran churches under the guise of "entertainment evangelism." We are following an order of worship that has stood the test of time while, at the same time, employing a variety in worship. Luther emphasized a creative tension in being faithful to the order of worship of the historic ecumenical church and responsive to the times in which he found himself. The goal is to allow this genius of the Reformat to guide and form our worship here today.
